

FAMOUS AVIATRIX FALLS TO DEATH

Laura Bromwell Loses Life When Plane Crashes. Held World Record.
 Mineola, N. Y., June 5.—Miss Laura Bromwell, holder of the loop the loop record for women, and one of the best known women pilots in the world, was killed at Mitchell field this afternoon. Miss Bromwell was flying at an altitude of about 1,000 feet. She had just completed one loop and was about to make a second when something went wrong with the plane and it crashed to the ground. Miss Bromwell, whose home was in Cincinnati, was 23 years old. She established her loop the loop record May 15 when she executed 199 loops in an hour and 20 minutes. The same afternoon she piloted her airplane over a two mile straight away course at the rate of 130 miles an hour. Military observers who witnessed the flight declared the girl's airplane motor stopped abruptly as she was making the upward turn of the loop. Suddenly, the machine fell backward into a tail spin and dropped like a plummet onto a road just outside the field. Hundreds of spectators gasped as the plane fell and then rushed to where it struck the ground. The girl's lifeless body was found in the tangled wreckage. Miss Bromwell had

tested her machine before engaging in her stunts, army officers said, and she pronounced it in good condition. Miss Bromwell's machine went through the first loop with the grace of a bird. She had just started a second when suddenly the hum of the motor stopped and the plane lurched sidewise. It seemed to remain suspended a minute and then started its meteoric drop. A dark object fell from the machine and many spectators, thinking that the straps holding the aviatrix in her seat had broken, shuddered and turned their heads. It later proved to be a seat cushion, released when Miss Bromwell was swung clear of the seat as the plane started to fall, upside down. Experienced aviators declared the girl's apparent inability to manipulate the control levers in an effort to right the plane probably was due to having swung from the seat so far she could not reach them. She was flying high enough, they said, to have brought the plane safely to earth, although the motor had stopped. Mineola, N. Y., June 5.—R. H. Depew, manager for Miss Bromwell at Mineola, issued the following statement: "Miss Bromwell's own plane was

out of order. She borrowed a Canadian training plane, a type which, because of Miss Bromwell's small stature, she was unsuited to stunt. I warned her not to attempt to loop it, but she disregarded the instructions. In the middle of the second loop the cushion she sat on fell out and she evidently slipped out of reach of the controls and was unable to right the plane. "Examination of the wreck disclosed all controls to be in working order."

COTTON MARKET BADLY DISRUPTED
Holidays Prevent Considerable Trading. Weather Big Factor.
 New Orleans, June 5.—Prices moved within a narrow range in the cotton market last week. Trading was badly broken up by the holidays of the week. The tendency of values was to sink to somewhat lower levels under reports of crop improvements. Closing prices were the lowest and they showed net losses of 38 to 52 points, July sinking to 12.02. At the highest of the week the list was 14 points under to 5 points over at the close of the preceding week with July at 12.55. In the spot department middling lost 25 points in the net result, closing at 1.63 against 4 a year ago. According to reports from the in-

terior, both private and official, the crop did better under high temperatures and scattered rains. The condition report by the government Thursday of 66 per cent. of a normal was about half a point higher than commonly expected, but 66 was a very low figure for May 25, comparing with 76.7 as the 10 year average for that date. The fact that the condition a year ago was 62.4 was hardly taken into consideration as it was generally held that this record breaking low report did not furnish a fair comparison. The report might have been construed bullishly because it was far under the ten year average for that date, but for the quite general belief that the condition had improved since March 25. Slight depressions occurred from the unfavorable labor news from England, much being made at the time of the continued failure to end the coal strike. Toward the end of the week a cablegram to brokers claimed that Lancashire spinners had stated positively that their mills would be closed if their employees did not accept the cut of 30 per cent. in wages which they are trying to put into effect. Labor troubles in the Carolinas were another adverse factor. At the end of the week there were rumors of another conference at London to listen to new proposals looking toward the

ending of the coal strike. Should anything result from this over Sunday of a favorable nature it would probably have a marked effect on the opening of the new week. Aside from the foreign conditions the trading this coming week will be chiefly concerned with the weather prevailing over the belt. Further rains in the central and in the north

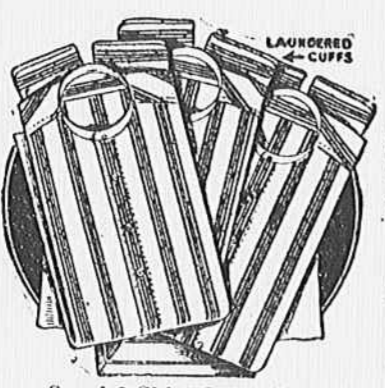

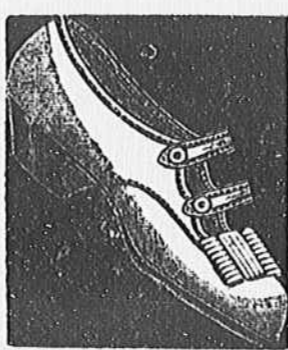

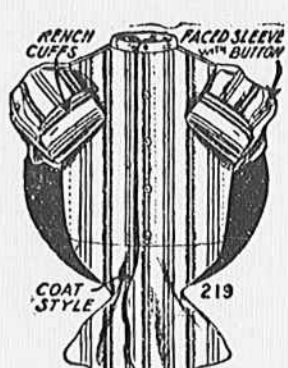
