Adopts New Lighting Schedule Acting on instructions from the committee from council authorized to confer with the city attorney in regard to a legal interpretation of the power contract between the city and the Reedy River Power Company, Mayor Franks stated yesterday that he had instructed J. E. Philpot, superintendent of water and lights, to cut on street lights a half hour after sunset in the evening and to cut them off one and a half hours before sunrise in the morning. Mr. Franks stated that he issued the order following an informal discussion of the matter by the council, when it was decided that the change in schedule would result in a saving of 32 minutes of power service per day to the city. Action on the matter was taken following a notice from the power company through Supt. J. E. Harney, that the city would be expected to follow a schedule which the power company submitted.

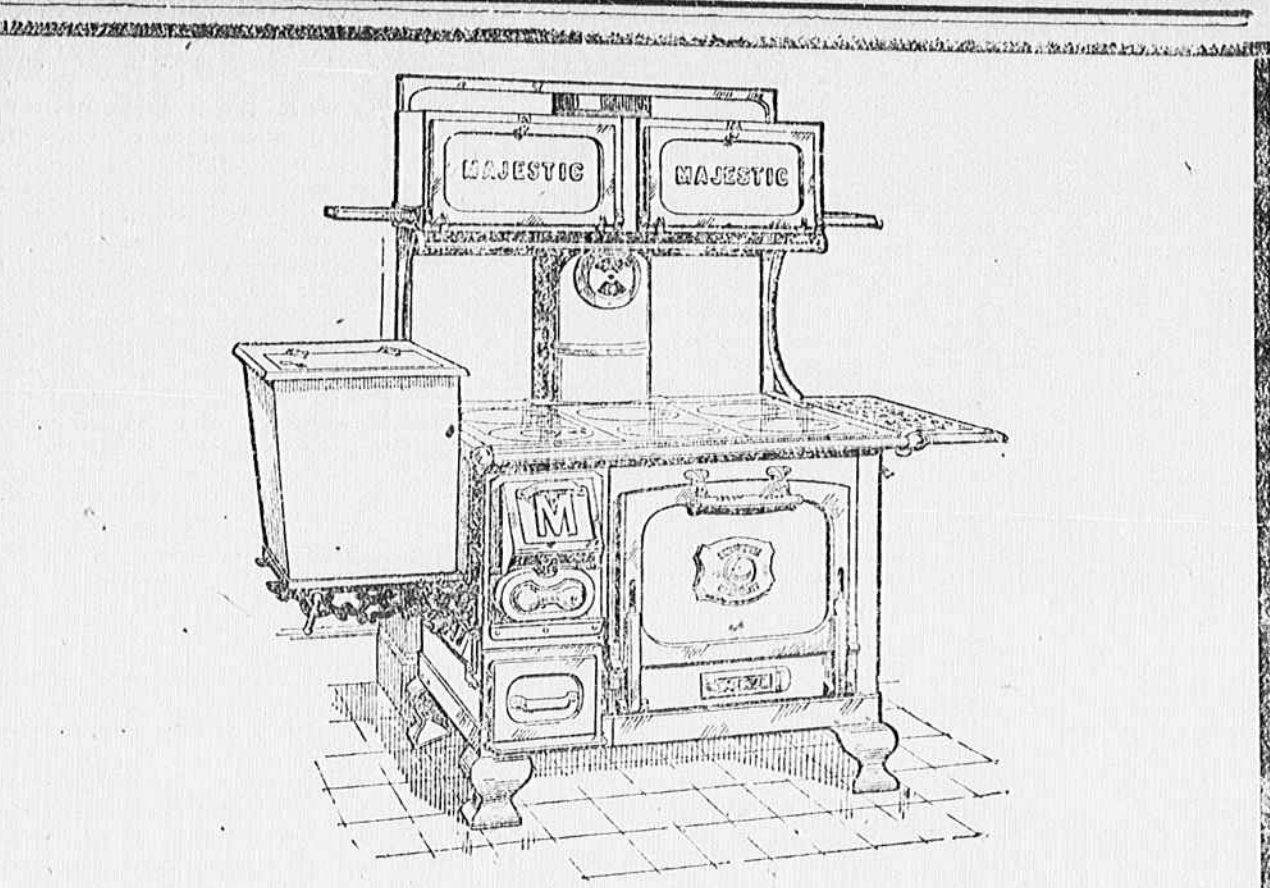
