

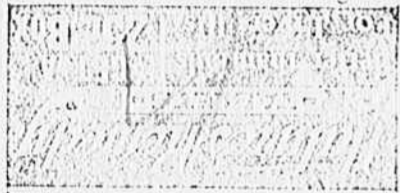
**ANOTHER NEGRO GOES BY HEMP ROUTE**

**Charged with Assault on a White Woman; After Hanging, Body Riddled.**  
Kinston, N. C., Aug. 14.—A mob variously estimated at 1,500 to 2,000 armed men captured Jerome Whitefield, negro, charged with criminal assault on a white woman of Jones county, and, after hanging him to an oak tree by the roadside, riddled his body with bullets, about noon today. The victim of the alleged assault, committed late yesterday, is reported to have positively identified the negro when he was taken to her home, six miles from the Jones county woods in which the capture was made this morning. She is the wife of a prominent Jones county farmer.

The search, begun last night, following the alleged crime about sunset, was continued throughout the night and until 11 o'clock this morning, when the negro was seen to emerge suddenly from a thicket. He was commanded to halt, which he did, according to reports here. Then he was placed in an automobile and rushed to the home of his alleged victim, who identified him, but cried, "Please don't kill him here in the yard," according to current accounts of the affair. "We won't," members of the crowd are said to have responded. The negro was taken to a point a mile from the home and hanged and shot, after which the mob dispersed, leaving the body hanging by the neck to the tree. It is said that fully a thousand bullets penetrated his body.

**L. Z. WILSON NAMED POSTMASTER AT GRAY COURT**

L. Z. Wilson Receives Instructions to Assume Charge Today of Gray Court Postoffice.

Gray Court, Aug. 14.—L. Z. Wilson, a well-known citizen of Gray Court and formerly employed in the postoffice at Laurens, last night received notice of his appointment as acting postmaster at Gray Court. He will assume charge of the office tomorrow, Aug. 15.

Mr. Wilson succeeds D. D. Peden, whose term of office expired July 1, 1920. Mr. Peden, who was considered to be a most efficient postmaster, was not a candidate for re-appointment. It is understood, he has held the office since May, 1919, succeeding the late L. C. Darrah.

While Mr. Wilson's appointment is as acting postmaster, it is confidently believed that his commission as postmaster will be received within a short time. Mr. Wilson was one of a number who were candidates for the local postmastership, and his friends today showered him with congratulations. He is a native of this section, is known and liked by all and expressions heard on all sides were that no candidate could have been more popular with the patrons of the local office.

Mr. Wilson was employed in the postoffice at Laurens for four years and, it is understood, was highly endorsed by his former associates in the postal business. Since retiring from the postal service, Mr. Wilson has been devoting his time to the management of his family interests near here.

Notice of Special Election on the Question of Issuing Coupon Bonds of the City of Laurens in the Sum of \$35,000 for Street Improvement.

Whereas, a written petition of a majority of the freeholders of the City of Laurens, as appears from the tax books of said City, has been filed with the City Council of the City of Laurens, asking that an election be held in said City of Laurens, at which shall be submitted to the qualified electors of said City the question of issuing coupon bonds of the City of

Laurens in the sum of \$35,000, payable within forty years from the date of issue, and bearing a rate of interest not exceeding six (6) percent, per annum, for the purpose of Street Improvement in said City; and,

Whereas, the said City Council of the City of Laurens has duly considered said petition, canvassed the same, and found it to be in proper form, and signed by the required number of freeholders, as prescribed by the Constitution and Statute Laws of the State of South Carolina, made and provided in such cases, and upon consideration thereof adopted an Ordinance and Resolution dated 14th day of July, 1921, that the prayer of the petition be granted and that the question of the issue of said bonds shall be submitted to the qualified, duly registered electors of said City of Laurens, at Special Election to be held in and for the said City of Laurens on the 23rd day of August, 1921.

NOW THEREFORE, Notice is hereby given that a Special Election will be held in the City of Laurens on the 23rd day of August, 1921, upon the question of issuing bonds of the City of Laurens in the sum of \$35,000, payable within forty years from date of issue, and bearing interest at not exceeding six (6) percent, per annum, for the purpose of Street Improvement in said City. 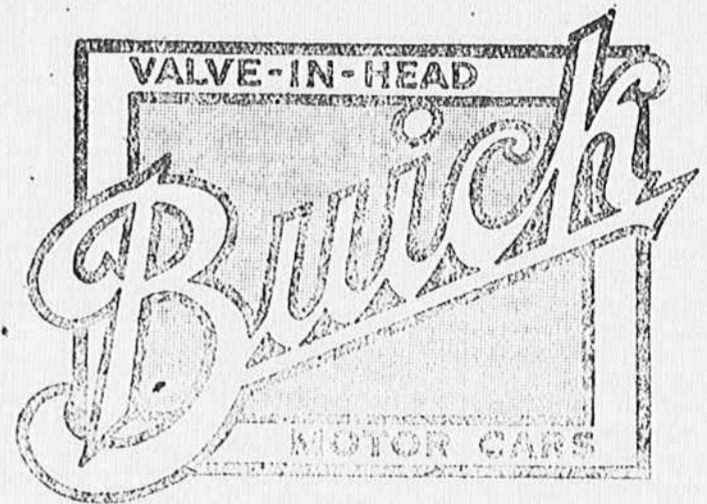
