KILLS SELF WITH "UNLOADED" PISTOL

Tragedy the Accidental Result of the
Careless Handling of a Pistol He
was Exhibiting to a Friend.

Greenville, Sept. 12.—While his
wife, looking on, pleaded with him to
be careful, Samuel Skelton, 26, book-
keeper for the Riverside Grocery Com-
pany, accidentally blew his brains out
with a .32-calibre Smith and Wesson
revolver which he thought was un-
loaded, in his rooms at 202 River
street yesterday afternoon. With
young Skelton in the room at the time
of the tragedy was E. L. Field, who
was spending the day with the young
man and who, only a few minutes be-
fore the fatal shot was fired, had been
asked by Skelton to buy the pistol. Mrs.
Skelton was standing in the doorway
and saw her husband pull the trigger
that sent the bullet through his head
and into the ceiling above. Though a
great hole was torn in young Skelton's
head and in spite of a great loss
of blood, he lived almost forty-five
minutes after being shot. He never
regained consciousness.

According to the story of the trag-
edy related by Mr. Field young Skelton
and he were in one of the up-
stairs rooms occupied by Mr. and
Mrs. Skelton, when Skelton took
from under a pillow on the bed a pearl
handled revolver and asked if he did
not want to buy it. Mr. Field stated
that he replied in the negative and
that Mr. Skelton began handling the
pistol rather carelessly when he
warned him to be more careful. Mr.
Skelton then unbreached the revolver
and as he thought, all of the cartridges
fell out. In the meantime Mrs. Skelton,
who was in an adjoining room had
heard the warning given her husband
by Mr. Field and came to the door.
Just as she was admonishing him to
be more careful in handling the wea-
pon, young Skelton placed the point of
the pistol against his right temple as
if to show that the weapon was harm-
less, began snapping the trigger. The
pistol went off and the only bullet that
was left in the chamber cut a great
hole through the unfortunate man's
head and lodged in the ceiling. A phy-
sician was summoned immediately but
nothing could be done to save his life.

Samuel Skelton was the eldest son
of Mr. and Mrs. S. O. Skelton, of 802
Augusta street. He has been connect-
ed with the Riverside Company, a
concern in which his father was once
interested, for some time. During the
World War he was in the medical
corps and was stationed at Fort
Oglethorpe. Two years ago he mar-
ried Miss Sarah Campbell, who sur-
vives him.

Mr. Skelton was well known and
was liked by a large circle of friends
in this city and section, where he has
resided the greater part of his life.

WARNS FARMERS TO MEET BOLL WEEVIL

Put Lands in Cover Crops, State En-
tomologist Advises; Winter May
Check Insects.

Clemson College, Sept. 8.—The mild-
ness of the coming winter will largely
determine whether the boll weevil will
virtually cripple the cotton growing
industry in this section next year, ac-
cording to A. F. Conradi, state en-
tomologist. If the winter is severe
cotton may again be grown profitably
in this section, Mr. Conradi thinks,
but if the winter is a mild one it will
mean that the boll weevil has become
a factor to be reckoned with through-
out the Piedmont section.

Regardless of what the approach-
ing winter may bring forth Mr. Con-
radi warns all farmers to prepare to
meet the boll weevil. The best way
to do this, he says, is to have a clean
fall culture and to put winter cover
crops on all lands. If this is done the
farmers have done all that human
agencies can do to combat the insect
which has never been successfully
checked since it crossed the Rio
Grande river from Mexico. Asked as
to whether the Piedmont section would
suffer less from the weevil than other
sections of the state Mr. Conradi said
that the Piedmont was handicapped
because of two facts. One of these is
the heavy clay soil and the second is
numerous terraces, offering a place of
hibernation for the insect.

To combat the weevil the farmers
must first of all destroy the hiding
places of the insects. While the soil
in this section needs humus badly, Mr.
Conradi thinks it would be even bet-
ter to burn the weevil-infested stalks
than to leave them above the ground.
The ideal way is to plow such stalks
at least six inches under the ground
but this requires greater mule power
than is possessed on many farms.

"The boll weevil makes cotton
growing next year an uncertainty,"
Mr. Conradi concluded. "Abundance
of the weevil depends upon the min-
imum temperature of winter and the
summer rainfall. If next winter is
mild we may expect a very unsuccess-
ful year in cotton growing."

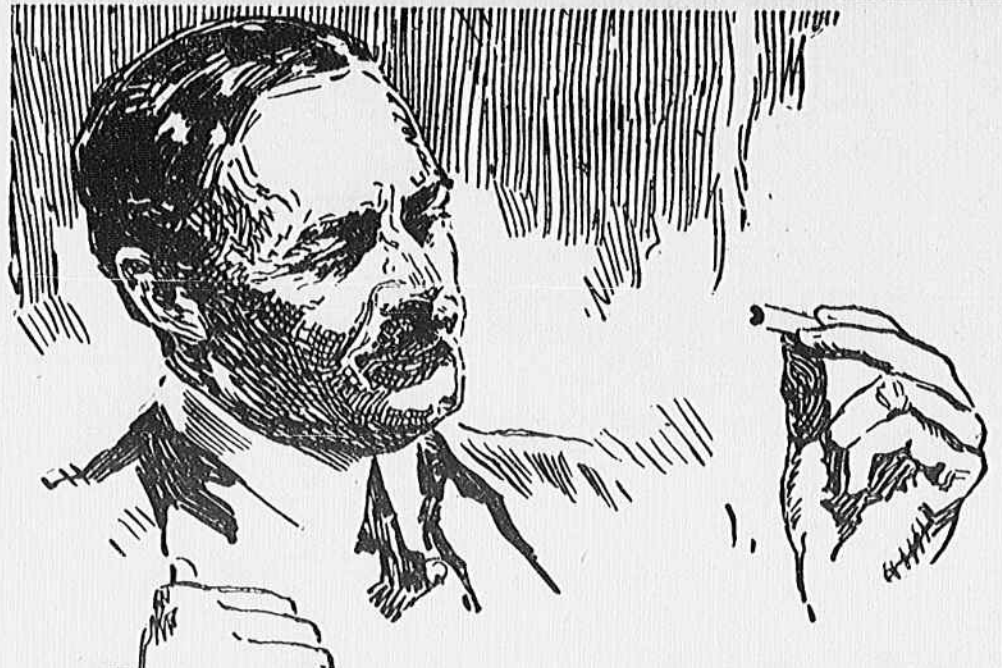
