### DOWN THE NUISANCE!

The Advertiser would be no far-seeing prophet were it to predict that the alleged slayers of Hosea Martin, city policeman, will seek to evade responsibility for his death. We are not sitting on their case here, but, regardless of what may be their plea, the facts remain that the dead officer came to his death in an attempt to enforce the law and, further, had public support in Clinton been given to Rural Policeman Abrams, conditions in that town would not have made it necessary for the Laurens police force to have been on the highway far from home in search of liquor runners. The Advertiser speaks measuredly when it says that exponents of law and order in our sister city need to be on the alert and, by their righteous wrath, demand and secure an abatement of the liquor nuisance in that town. We all know that the liquor nuisance is there and that to it may be ascribed the death of a faithful officer.

### A QUESTION OF RENT

The question of placing a prohibitive license on outside people who come into their towns as vendors of fruits, vegetables and other things is agitating the minds of merchants in neighboring towns as it has agitated the minds of local merchants from time to time. There is no doubt but that the prohibitive license would be an unjust act, unjust both to the vendor and the consumer of his wares, but there is another side to the question. Merchants in Laurens, for instance, pay a high rental for the privilege of doing business facing the main thoroughfares of the city, they pay an additional tax on their merchandise, another license tax and still another tax through their water and light rates for the up-keep, protection and lighting of those thoroughfares and then, in addition, are prevented by ordinance from obstructing them. The total charges for these privileges amount to a tidy sum. The outside vendor comes in during the flush season, takes a choice location on the best street in town, pays no rent, gets his light from overhead at the expense of the local man with whom he competes and doesn't even pay a tax on his stock of goods. Any protective tax is considered obnoxious in the South, but freedom from rent and taxes is another matter. No city should allow outsiders, or insiders for that matter, to obstruct its streets or sidewalks for purposes of trade at any price, but if the practice is to be allowed a rental should be charged in keeping with rentals in the particular district where it is allowed. If this were done, the disparity in prices between the outsider and the home merchant would soon disappear. So would the outsider. This, of course, does not refer to the farmer selling his produce in town.
