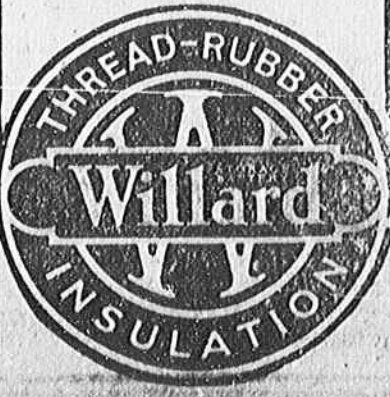

**FERTILIZER MAKERS BUY GERMAN POTASH**

**Contracts Disclose that American Fertilizer Makers Agree to Buy 75 Per Cent of Needs From Germany.**

Washington, Dec. 29.—A copy of a contract entered into by 34 American manufacturers of fertilizers with the potash syndicate of Germany by which the former bind themselves to purchase 75 per cent of their potash requirements from the latter was read today in the record of the tariff hearings of the senate finance committee.

The contracts were produced by S. D. Crenshaw, vice president of the Virginia-Carolina Chemical company of Richmond, Va., and in ordering it placed in the record Senator Smoot (Republican) of Utah, said he wanted to show to senators that it not only evaded all anti-dumping laws passed by congress but also all American anti-trust laws.

"If that contract can stand," Senator Smoot declared, "Germany will see that the potash industry in the United States will never be developed."

Mr. Crenshaw, whose company is a member of the party to the contract, said the instrument is so drawn that the American manufacturers could buy 25 per cent of their supply from French or domestic sources. It developed, however, that the American firm would get a lower rate per ton if they bought their entire supply from the German syndicate than if they bought only 75 per cent from that source.

Arguments against a tariff on potash were presented also by Representative Benham (Republican) of Indiana, spokesman for New Jersey farmers, and S. A. Houston of New York city, representing the German potash syndicate. Representatives of the industry will be heard tomorrow.

Mr. Benham, who said that before he was elected to congress his principal vocation was "the doctoring of sick farms," told the committee that he was a high protectionist for any promising American industry but that he had been unable to find any official or other evidence that the American potash producing industry was "a promising one."

Spokesmen for the New Jersey farmers and Mr. Houston emphasized what they said would be the cost to the American farmers and finally to the consumers of a duty on potash. The New Jersey men estimated that the duty would add a cost of \$4 an acre to the production of potatoes in their state and they argued that in the present condition of agriculture no additional burdens should be placed on the farmers.

Mr. Houston told the committee that the German law prohibiting the sale of German potash abroad at a price lower than obtaining in Germany effectively prevented the dumping of potash into the United States or any other country.

**INCOME TAX BLANK GOES TO PRINTER**

**For Incomes Not Above Five Thousand Dollars. Million of Copies.**

Washington, Jan. 1.—Drafting of the new 1921 income tax return form for incomes of \$5,000 or less has been completed by the tax simplification board, of which J. H. Beal, of Pittsburgh is chairman, it was said tonight at the treasury.

The new forms, which are regarded as much more simple and less confusing than those in use last year, have gone to the printers and probably will be ready for distribution about January 15. From 15,000,000 to 20,000,000 copies of the new forms are being printed and it is estimated that 25 freight cars will be required to send them to internal revenue collectors throughout the country. Efforts to simplify Form 1040—which is the form used by the average taxpayer—has resulted in reducing the number of pages from six to four and in eliminating the block system of return utilized in 1920, which was said to be confusing to the great majority of taxpayers who had income from only one or two sources. The internal revenue bureau estimated 70 per cent of the persons using the \$5,000 form have income from only salaries and wages and possibly interest and have few deductions to make from that income.

The new form will require taxpayers to list on the first page the amount of income received from a number of sources and then from the total of these amounts to deduct the amounts to which they are legally entitled, the balance being the taxable net income.

The second page will require certain information from persons receiving income from specified sources, such as a business carried on by the taxpayer, and the third and fourth pages are devoted to instructions.

By reducing the form to four pages the board has eliminated the duplicate or "work sheet" of the 1920 form but it was explained if taxpayers wish to keep a copy of their returns sufficient forms will be available for duplicates to be obtained.

**NEW POSTMASTERS TO ATTEND SCHOOL**

**General Accounting Postoffices Will be Designated in Each State.**

Washington, Jan. 1.—Beginning with the new year, under orders issued today by Postmaster General Hays, newly appointed postmasters will be required to attend school, where they will be taught, among other things, how to meet the public, their places in the community, how, through publicity, to educate the public in the use of the mails, how to handle complaints, guard the mails and maintain proper relationship with the department.

Central accounting postoffices will be designated in each state as schools for the instruction of postmasters of the second and third class, under the direction of First Assistant Postmaster General Work, as "superintendent" of schools.

Newly appointed postmasters will be advised by letter "that his city's welfare to a very great extent depends upon his willingness and capacity to give it better postal service". After the intensive course aimed to impress upon the new official, that "he is local manager of the biggest business institution in the world," he will be required to write the department giving a review of what he had learned, so that it may be determined, Mr. Hays said, whether he is qualified to serve behind a placard reading:

"Ask your postmasters when you want to know."

**FORMER GOVERNOR BURIED THURSDAY**

**Governor Cooper and Dr. E. W. Sikes Attend Bickett Funeral.**

Raleigh, N. C., Dec. 29.—Thomas Walter Bickett, North Carolina's war governor, who died Wednesday morning following a stroke of paralysis, a little less than 12 months after he retired from office, was buried in Louisburg this afternoon, following simple funeral services at Christ church here.

The Rt. Rev. J. B. Cheshire, bishop of the diocese of North Carolina, and the Rev. M. A. Barber, rector of Christ church, conducted the service. The honorary pall bearers included the council of state, the Wake county bar, and Josephus Daniels, former secretary of the navy.

R. A. Cooper, governor of South Carolina, a close friend of Mr. Bickett, and Dr. E. W. Sikes, president of Coker College, Hartsville, S. C., an old schoolmate, were among the out of state attendants at the funeral.

The funeral party left the state capitol for the church after the casket bearing the body of the former governor had rested in state for two hours and after throngs of mourning admirers had filed by while members of the service company, First regiment of North Carolina national guard, stood at parade rest at the head and the foot of the casket.

Flags of all public buildings were at half mast today, the state capitol building was draped in mourning and all the departmental offices were closed.
