POISONED LIQUOR TAKES HEAVY TOLL

Nine Dead and Five Blinded or Ill is the List to Date.

New York, Dec. 29.—A gray haired woman and a 14 year old boy tonight were added to the list of New York victims of poisonous holiday liquor which now totals nine dead and five blinded or seriously ill.

The woman was found lying on the sidewalk and died enroute to a hospital. In her handbag was a slip of paper bearing the name "Miss Hargent." She was about 50 years old and well dressed. Medical examiners said she had drunk wood alcohol.

The boy, John Dooley, was taken from his home after losing consciousness. At the hospital police announced he had been given liquor by neighbors and also had drunk some he found near his home.

During the day Charles Williams, a negro, died in a hospital whither he had made his way, half blinded from drinking poison which he thought was gin. Hospital attaches said it was wood alcohol.

The fourth fatality within 24 hours was George L. Henry, a salesman of Brookline, Mass., who was found dead in bed in a Broadway hotel. An empty bottle labeled "gin" and another containing alleged whiskey were found nearby.

Of those still living, two are women and one is an unidentified man taken to Bellevue hospital after having been found lying in a gutter unconscious. He was said to be suffering from wood alcohol poisoning.
