HESTER DEFENDS

COTTON FUTURES

Says Cotton Is the Most Liquid Asset Known to World's Trade; Warns the Law Makers.

New Orleans, Feb. 23.—A defense of the futures contract in dealing with cotton was voiced by Col. Henry G. Hester, for 51 years secretary of the New Orleans cotton exchange in an address before the commissioners appointed by the various governors of the cotton states, who began here today the study of problems affecting the cotton industry.

"We must remember that cotton is the most liquid asset known to the world's trade and through futures, every minute of the day and night, and from one end of the year to the other cotton may be purchased," declared Colonel Hester. He deplored the fact that laws have been suggested to congress whereby the New York and New Orleans cotton exchanges may be regulated as to their dealings in futures. He warned the law-makers present at the conference that while it might lie in the power of the government to regulate the New York and New Orleans exchanges that Havre, Liverpool and other foreign exchanges could not be regulated.

"You are here to devise a system of education for both white and colored that will teach them to properly grow cotton of high grades," said Colonel Hester. "Your aim should be to do away with trash or unspinnable cotton. You will also have to devise some method whereby the public can be enlightened and enlist the aid of the national and state governments to get us out of the mud."

CHARGE HOLD UP

WAS NOT GENUINE

Mrs. Robertson Detained by Police, Youth Also Held.

Long Branch, N. J., Feb. 22.—Mrs. Sarah H. Robertson who Saturday night reported to the police that she had been dramatically robbed of \$50,000 worth of jewelry during a dinner party she was giving at her home in Deal, tonight stood charged with faking the hold-up in order to obtain the insurance money on her jewels.

In custody also was John Bailey, a Long Branch youth, who was alleged by the police to have told them that he had been offered \$1,000 to invade the Robertson home and "rob" her. Samuel Gasm, a telegraph operator, was arrested on charges of having entered the conspiracy and aided the supposed robber. He was released on \$15,000 bail.

The same bail also was set for both Mrs. Robertson and Bailey, but neither could get any one to free them when they faced the magistrate. It was announced if the bail was not forthcoming by night, both would be taken to the county jail at Freehold.

Mrs. Robertson underwent a long grilling by the police who placed before her their charges that the elaborately described pistol used by the "bandit" was only a leather pipe case and that the bag of "jewels" she handed over contained only tissue paper. She steadfastly maintained her innocence of the two conspiracy accusations lodged against her. Harry C. Faber of Belmar, who was one of the guests at the party Saturday night, was quizzed by the police who quoted him as saying that a month ago he was approached by Gasm and asked to do the hold-up stunt. He said he refused, according to the police, who added that he told them that when he saw the "robber" at the dining room door Saturday he immediately recalled the request upon him and realized that the hold-up was a fake. He was in tears the police say when they entered his home this morning and he explained that he had been unable to sleep since the incident Saturday night.

David S. Meyer, a real estate broker of Long Branch, who also was a guest that evening was reported to have lost \$50 in the "robbery." The police said he told them that when the intruder ordered him to put his money on the table he obeyed. The money fell into a dish of tomatoes and he claimed never to have seen it again. Bailey, the police said, denied taking the \$50 and said not only had he not received a cent from Mrs. Robertson but was out \$5 taxi fare.

Agents for Lloyd's, Ltd., the British company with which Mrs. Robertson's jewelry was insured, declared they would await further developments before making any decision regarding the insurance money.
