Valiant Southampton Veterans Have Exciting Time When They Go to Assistance of Brother's Who Had Caught Whale.

Southampton.-For the second time In two weeks fishermen took to their boats and went out after a whale. They had him hooked, too; and if the durn thing hadn't up with its tall and knocked Cap'n Silas Edwards out of the boat just as he, was about to spear it, there might even now be a dead whale on the beach.
