

NEGRO ASKS INJUNCTION AGAINST MOLESTATION

Winder, Ga., May 27.—Action for \$50,000 damages and a petition for injunction to restrain certain white men of Barrow county from molesting him further was filed in superior court here this afternoon by Andrew McCusky, negro farmer, reputed to own 300 acres of land.

The petition stated that a mob visited his home upon a recent night and fired into it, wounding him, and terrifying his family.

Judge Blanton Fortson, of Athens circuit of superior court, this afternoon signed the temporary restraining order.

SPECIAL WARNING ISSUED TO CANNERS OF FOODS

Great Care Should be Taken to Handle Only Pure and Fresh Meats and Vegetables.

Rock Hill, S. C., May 22, 1922.

Dear Club Members:

The recent publicity given through the press to the food poisoning cases caused by the consumption of home-canned products makes it imperative that the greatest care and every precaution must be used for canning foods in the home and for market. We do not intend for any cases of botulinus or ptomaine poisoning to occur from canning done among our members. Such disasters have not yet arisen and we must maintain our record; therefore, we issue the following:

1. Poisonous compounds are often formed during the process of decomposition of foods rich in protein by the action of certain bacteria. It is of the utmost importance, therefore, to use for canning only such meats and vegetables as are known to be absolutely fresh and clean.
2. Occasionally people are found who think the high temperature used in the canning of foods will make them safe and even wholesome, although putrefaction has begun. This is absolutely false. While certain disease-producing bacteria will be killed by the canning process, still most, unless it is fresh and from animals absolutely healthy and in prime condition, and vegetables, unless they are fresh from the garden, should never be canned. The condition of canned food when the can is opened should be carefully noted. There should be no bad odors.
3. Practice great care in handling and preparing products for canning, and work very quickly.
4. Adhere to rules recommending temperature and time necessary for safe processing as indicated in your time table (Farmers' Bulletin 1211, Home Canning of Fruits and Vegetables, pages 49-50; Farmers' Bulletin A-92, Home Canning of Meats and Sea Foods with Steam Pressure Canner).
5. Cool all canned products as quickly as possible after processing.
6. Keep canned foods in cool place.

CONVICTED MAN THANKS JURY FOR VERDICT

Dallas, Texas, May 26.—D. E. Soderman was found guilty of manslaughter in connection with the killing of Jay Clay Powers, hotel owner, actor and playwright by a jury in criminal district court tonight and sentenced to five years in the penitentiary.

The jury rendered its verdict after having been out four hours and forty-five minutes.

Six ballots were taken, according to E. B. Williams, foreman, the sentence was the maximum under the law.

Judge C. A. Pippin, complimented the jury "for its courage in rendering its verdict."

"It is a great day in our courts when men have the courage and fearlessness to make such a verdict," the judge said.

"It's not right, but I thank you," called Soderman to the jury, with the reading of the verdict.

"It's not fair," Mrs. Soderman sobbed.
