



Professor Nystrom's Figures Professor Nystrom figures that out of each dollar that a consumer spends with a mail-order house, twenty per cent goes toward the cost of the mail-order house and ten per cent for the cost of mailorder transportation, a total of thirty per cent. Out of every dol-

lar spent at a local store, twelve per cent is for the wholesaler's post, two per cent for transportation and sixteen per cent for the retailer, a total of thirty per cent.

Thus the costs of doing business are the same, but the mail-order method has three distinct disadvantages for the consumer: (1). Interest is lost on money paid in advance. (Where one mail-order house sometimes receives more than one million dollars in a single day the interest on this money for the time prior to the receipt of the goods is considerable). (2) Delay in receiving the goods and in exchanging goods. (3) Impossibility of examining merchandise \* previous to receipt of goods,
