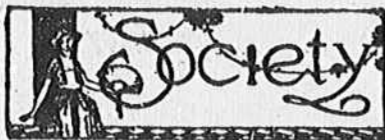


Local and Personal Mention

Enterprise National Bank Secured Moving Pictures Giving Valuable Information to Farmers. Others will be Shown Later.

About 500 farmers were the guests last Saturday morning and afternoon of the Enterprise National Bank at the free moving picture exhibition given at the Opera House. The seven reels of film shown at both performances were secured from the United States Department of Agriculture by the Enterprise Bank.

The pictures portrayed different phases of modern agriculture, cattle and hog raising. Particular interest was manifested by the farmers in the pictures showing the correct methods of sweet potato curing and storage. Showing both the right and wrong method of handling the sweet potato, the farmers were able to learn a valuable lesson on how to make the potato crop a source of revenue the year round.

The films devoted to hog raising, entitled "Health For Hogs" showed why and how to keep hogs clean. "Health for Hogs Pays" and "Sunlight Kills the Germs That Kill the Hogs" were among the readings in the picture.

Guernseys, Holsteins, Ayrshires, Jerseys, Hereford and other types of well-bred cattle were shown in the picture entitled, "Great Dairy Sires and Their Daughters." That it pays to have well bred cattle was proven when the picture quoted the milk and butter production of some well bred types of cattle as compared to that of ordinary cows.

Farmers seeing the pictures, having enjoyed and appreciated them, Mr. Roper, of the Enterprise Bank, plans to secure others which will be shown in the near future. 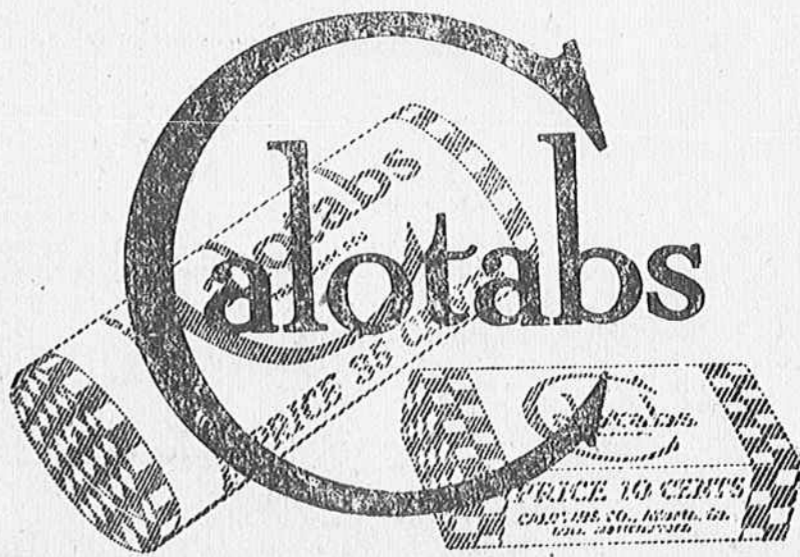
