Church Street Improvements Subject of Council Debate
Special Meeting of City Council Held Last Wednesday. Contract Award Deferred for Ten Days.

Prolonged debate marked a special meeting of the city council last Wednesday night called for the purpose of opening bids of contractors for the improvements of Church street. A motion that the bids be received as information and that the council reserve the award of the contract for ten days brought forth considerable discussion as well as motions and amendments regarding the width of the proposed pavement. A motion that space for a park be reserved on Church street from West Main street to the intersection of Laurens street, the space to be 5 feet wide, and that the balance of the street be improved with a pavement 18 feet wide was finally passed. Another motion that the pavement be of 7-inch concrete was also passed.

Financing the work on this street was the biggest problem that the council tried to solve at the meeting. Many proposals were offered. After many discussions a motion was passed instructing the finance committee to investigate the question of financing the Church street project and that the committee consult the Bond Commission to endeavor to arrange with them for the anticipation of money on the sale of bonds, or to negotiate a loan if the latter proposition falls.

Free Joint Concert at Watts Sunday
Total of 63 Pieces of Newberry and Watts Mills Bands will Play Sunday Afternoon at Watts.

A joint concert by the Newberry and Watts Mills concert band has been arranged to be given Sunday, June 25 at 3 o'clock at the Watts Mill bandstand. This is a return visit of the Newberry band, the Watts band having played in Newberry last year.
