Wharton said, "As Dr. Jones had led the fight to have it rebuilt, it should remain where there had been a crossing for more than a half century." All honor to the memory of my departed friend. The genial, generous, companionable, warm-hearted friend, staunch patriot, eminent statesman, gallant soldier, affectionate husband and father and high-toned gentleman. How inspiring and ennobling such a life; he was a benefactor of the purest type; what a rich legacy he has bequeathed to his children. Let us emulate his virtues and revere his memory. The tenderest sympathy of every one is felt for the bereaved ones.

THREE INDICTMENTS AGAINST GUARDS

Violations of Harrison Narcotic Act Charged by Federal Grand Jury, Atlanta, June 16.—Indictments charging violation of the Harrison narcotic act were returned here today by the federal grand jury against three guards at the Atlanta federal penitentiary and testimony of witnesses in so-called patronage cases was then begun.

Clarke Greer of Augusta, a leader in the Republican faction in Georgia, opposing J. L. Phillips, state chairman, and several letter carriers were the first witnesses called in the inquiry into complaints that officeholders, Democrats as well as Republicans, had been required to contribute to a Republican "educational fund". Only a few of the 50 witnesses summoned were heard today.

J. E. Dean, John B. Owens and R.

H. Massey, guards at the federal prison, who were indicted under the narcotic act were alleged by federal officers to have had a hand in smuggling drugs in to prisoners. They were released today under \$200 bail each. Dean and Owens issued a signed statement saying the affair was a "dastardly frame-up" and that "rumors have reached our ears to the effect that our positions are wanted by certain politicians who would like to fill the same with men from their own party."
