BONUS HEASURE LEADS TO HOT SENATE FIGHT

Democrats Attack Reported Republican Compromise to Side-Track Bill for Tariff on Monday.

Washington, June 17 .- The soldiers' bonus fight broke unexpectedly in the senate today when democratic senators attacked the reported compromise of republican leaders not to call up the measure next Monday but to have it follow the tariff bill. For two hours the party leaders clashed but with no effect except for additional indications that the republican plan would prevail. Open declarations, however, that an effort would be made in any event to call up the bill next week and the situation was further complicated by fallure of the senate teday to dispose of the naval bill which went over until Monday largely because of to-Tay's protracted discussion of the tonus.

The senate fray followed confernces between President Harding and republican leaders at which the president was assured that Monday's conference of the republican senators would result in holding the tariff between the senate but with a declaration the bonus bill should be passed before congress adjourns.

That the president would sign the bill if passed and that it undoubtedly would be passed before adjournment was stated during the senate debate by Chairman McCumber, of the senate finance committee in charge of both the tariff and bonus measures.

The senate debate was enlivened by a charge from Senator Walsh, democrat, Massachusetts, that an "honest majority" of the senate was not behind the bonus bill and that a group of senators professing to favor it were "duckng and dodging" and seeking to avoid going on record, Senator Ashurst, democrat, Arizona, who initiated the discussion demanded early action on the bonus measure and predicted its defeat if it should not be put ahead of the tariff,

Congress would adjourn after dis-Ashurst.

Senator McComber was asked pointblank by Eenator Ashurst whether he intended to carry out his plan announced June 8 to call up the prevented Senator McCumber from replying immediately but later Senator McCumber in a lengthy statement in behalf of the bonus said he would be content if the republican son. conference Monday would renew definitely what he said was the pledge of the party in power to pass the bill before adjournment.

"We'll understand Monday and defiretely," said Senator McCumber, pounding his desk with his fist, whether we're going to keep faith. I believe that we will. It is my duty to put the tariff bill through. It also is my duty to see that this other bill (the bonus) goes through and I intend to see to it that they do go through and there will be no adjournment of this session until they do go through."

Sonator Borah, republican, Idaho, saigi the republican conference decision did not bind individual senators and that he had not attended the conference which declared for passage of the bonus measure.

Senator McCumber said rumors were current that some democratic senators intended to filibuster against the bonus bill in order to declare the tariff measure f the bonus should be put ahead, but Senator happenings. Ashurst denied that any filibuster would be attempted.


