

QUESTIONS TO BE ASKED CANDIDATES

League of Women Voters Wants to Hear from Legislative Candidates.
The State League of Women Voters has announced that the questions will be asked of the candidates for the legislature in each county in the state during the coming primary. The candidate will be expected to answer each and every question plainly and the newspapers will be asked to publish their replies.

The questions to be put to the candidates are:

1. Will you vote for an eight-hour law for women and children under sixteen years?
Answer.
2. Will you vote for the establishment of a woman's state prison farm, as provided for in bill introduced in legislature last year?
Answer.
3. Will you vote for a bill which will require a health certificate before the issuance of a marriage license?
Answer.
4. Will you vote for an increased provision for feeble-minded?
Answer.
5. Will you vote for a bill requiring medical examination of school children and the sanitary inspection of school property?
Answer.
6. Will you vote for adequate financial support of the State Board of Health and your county health department?
Answer.
7. Will you vote for a county attendance officer?
Answer.
8. Will you vote for raising the age of consent for girls from sixteen to eighteen years?
Answer.
9. Will you vote to place at least

one woman on the board of every institution where the welfare of women and children are concerned?
Answer.

10. Will you vote for an appropriation for the Charleston County Tuberculosis Sanatorium for the care of free and pay patients from the city and county of Charleston?
