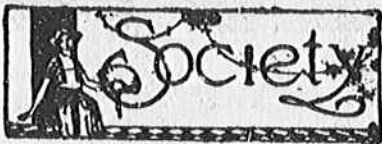


Local and Personal Mention

MRS. IDA HUDGENS TEAGUE

Native of This County Passed Away at Her Home in Arkansas Last Week.

Mrs. Ida Hudgens Teague, wife of Rev. Eugene F. Teague, both natives of this county, died at Amity, Arkansas, the adopted home of the family, last Tuesday, according to a telegram received by Mr. W. P. Hudgens, brother of the deceased. While the relatives here had known of her illness for several weeks, nevertheless the message produced profound sorrow, this being the first death among the children of the Hudgens family.

Besides her husband, she is survived by three sons and five daughters. Her immediate relatives in this county are her mother, Mrs. Mollie Hudgens, widow of the late Hon. Jno. M. Hudgens, three brothers, W. P., Ambrose L. and Jno. H., and four sisters, Mrs. Alice Teague, Mrs. Guy Smith, Mrs. J. B. Hill and Mrs. Ross Power.

Rev. and Mrs. Teague moved from this county to Arkansas in 1893, together with their brother and sister, Mr. and Mrs. Jesse Teague, and their father, Mr. Ludie Teague. Later Messrs. Ludie and Jesse Teague died and were buried at Hollywood, Arkansas, and on Wednesday of last week the late Mrs. Teague was laid to rest in the same cemetery. The family once lived at Hollywood but moved to Amity where Mr. Teague is pastor of a group of Baptist churches.

MRS. R. T. McDONALD DEAD

Sister of Messrs. Mills and Hamp Hunter, of This City, Died in Atlanta Friday Morning. Burial at Ora Sunday.

Mrs. Ora Hunter McDonald, widow of the late R. T. McDonald who was a civil engineer of note, died in an Atlanta hospital Friday morning following an operation for appendicitis the Sunday before. Her body was carried to Greenwood Saturday where it lay at the home of her sister, Mrs. N. A. Craig, until Sunday morning when it was carried to Old Fields church cemetery, at Ora, where interment took place in the presence of a large number of sorrowing friends and relatives. The services were conducted by Rev. I. N. Kennedy and Rev. C. T. Squires.

Mrs. McDonald was the eldest daughter of the late Dr. J. P. Hunter and his wife, Eliza Dillard Hunter, of this county. It was while the Charleston & Western Carolina railroad was being built that she met and married Mr. McDonald, who was then in charge of construction of a large link of this road and who named the station of Ora after her. Mr. McDonald died in Jacksonville, Fla., where he was then living, about eight years ago and after that Mrs. McDonald lived with her children at Kirkwood, near Atlanta, Georgia.

Mrs. McDonald was a sister of Messrs. J. Mills and M. Hamp Hunter, of this city, O. L. Hunter, of Ora, and Mrs. N. A. Craig, of Greenwood a half brother, James L. Hunter, lives in Florida. She is also survived by two daughters and two sons, all of whom live at Kirkwood, Ga., as follows: Mrs. Eliza Muse, Messrs. Tyler and Alfred McDonald and Miss Evelyn McDonald.

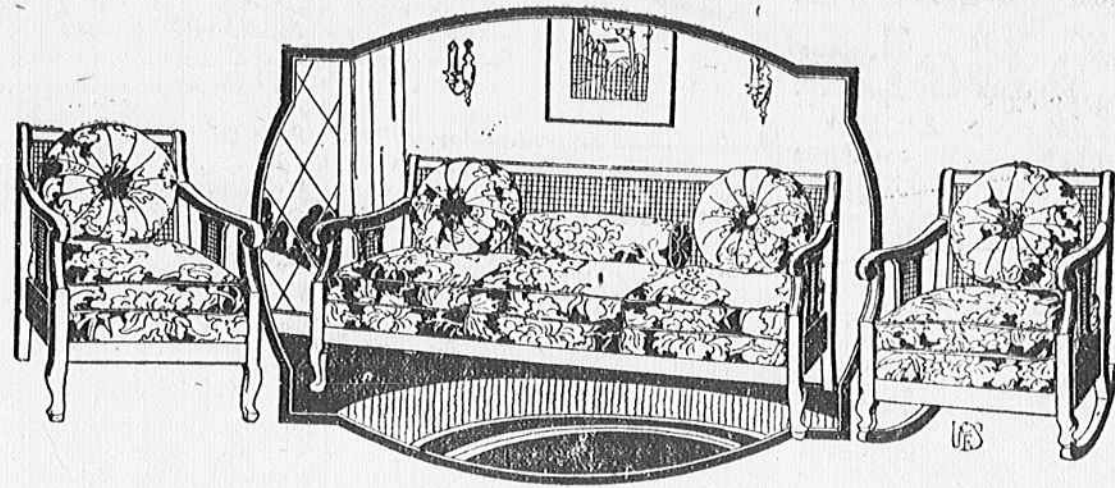
