PROHIBITION LAWS AGAIN EXPLAINED

Rabbis, Ministers and Priests May Supervise Manufacture of Altar Wines.

Washington, July 16.—Rabbis, ministers and priests, duly appointed by the heads of the ecclesiastical jurisdictions to their churches, may supervise the manufacture and distribution of altar wines in their specified territories, under new regulations being considered tonight by Revenue Commissioner Blair in accordance with an opinion by Attorney General Daugherty.

The national prohibition act, Mr. Daugherty held, indicated an intent on the part of congress to place in the hands of the church itself a power whereby it will never be forced to use inferior products for sacrament, nor ever be left without means of supplying its needs for sacramental wines.

"The intent of congress is clear," the attorney general said, "to abolish the business of the middle man or retail distributor in sacramental wines, but the intent is equally apparent to permit the church, if it agrees to assume the responsibility through its duly authorized rabbi, minister or priest, full power to supervise the manufacture of altar wines and it is my opinion that the specific grant of the greater privilege of the supervision of manufacture carried with it the lesser privilege of supervision of distribution."

The attorney general's opinion put an end to a long drawn out fight by various religious bodies, who claimed that the elimination of the sacramental wine dealers from business, through the denial of treasury permits shut off all legitimate channels for obtaining proper wines for sacramental purposes and forced the churches to use spirits of uncertain standard.

SIX PERSONS KILLED

Train Strikes Automobile at Maine Crossing.

Waterville, Maine, July 16.—Six persons were killed when a Maine Central railroad train struck an automobile at a blind crossing near the Unity station early today. A baby girl was the sole survivor of the party of seven in the automobile. The infant was thrown 30 feet from the tracks and escaped with minor bruises.

The dead: Evert L. Varney, his wife and five year old son, Malcolm, of Burnham.

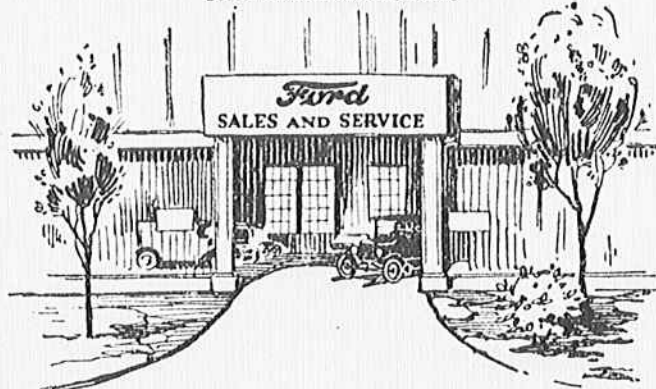

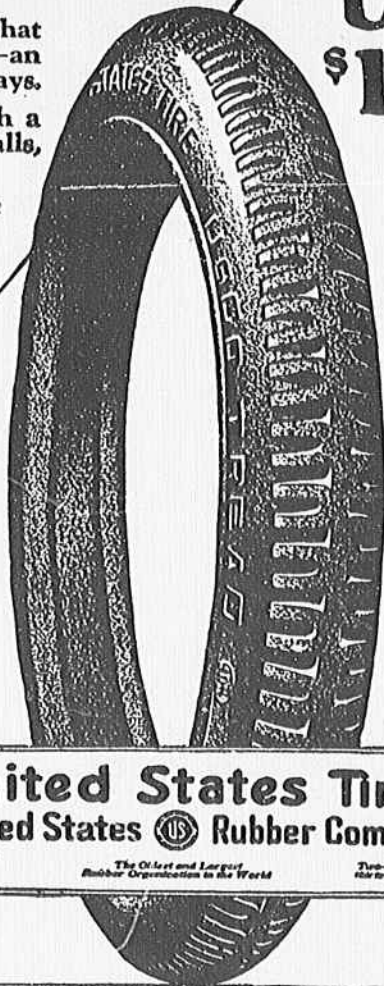

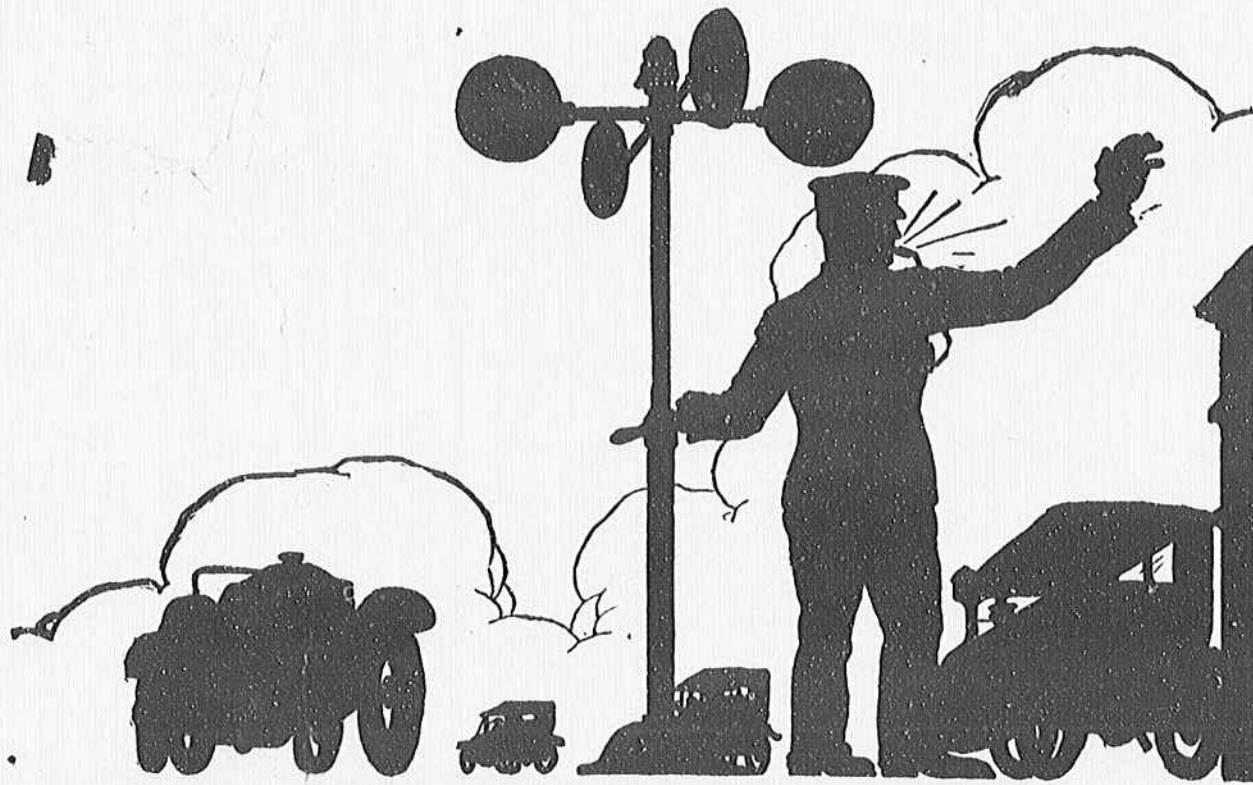
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
