

NOTICE SCHOOL OF OPENING
 To Patrons of Laurens City Schools:
 The 1922-23 session of the Laurens City Schools will begin on Monday, September 11 at 9 A. M.
 New pupils will be enrolled on September 14th, 5th and 6th. Examinations for conditioned pupils will be held on September 7th and 8th.
 I wish to call attention to some regulations required by law as follows:
Compulsory Attendance—Every parent, guardian, or other person having charge of any child between eight and fourteen years of age inclusive, must send such child to a public, private or parochial school, or to a competent tutor, subject to the approval of the County Superintendent of Education, for four consecutive months, or eighty consecutive school days, during the scholastic year that the school attended is in session. The period of compulsory attendance for the Laurens City Schools, as fixed by the Board of Trustees, is for the first four school months, beginning September 11, 1922.
Age of Attendance—It shall not be lawful for any person who is less than six nor more than twenty-one years of age to attend any of the free public schools of this state.
Vaccination—Any board of education, school trustees, or any other body having control of any of the schools, may prohibit the entrance into or attendance at any school of all unvaccinated persons who have not had the smallpox.
 Parents are urged to have their children vaccinated before the opening of school in order that some arms may not interfere with their school work.

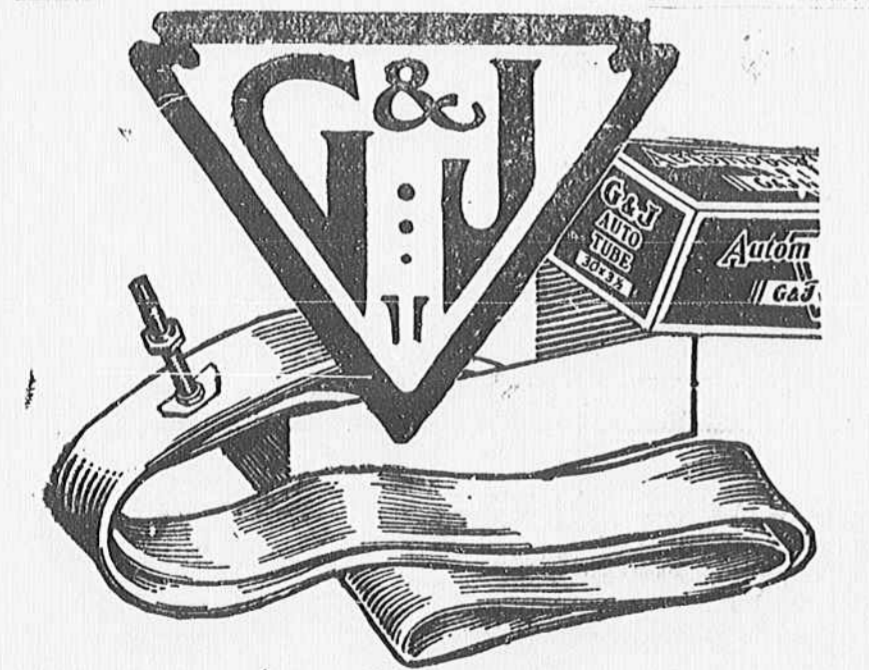

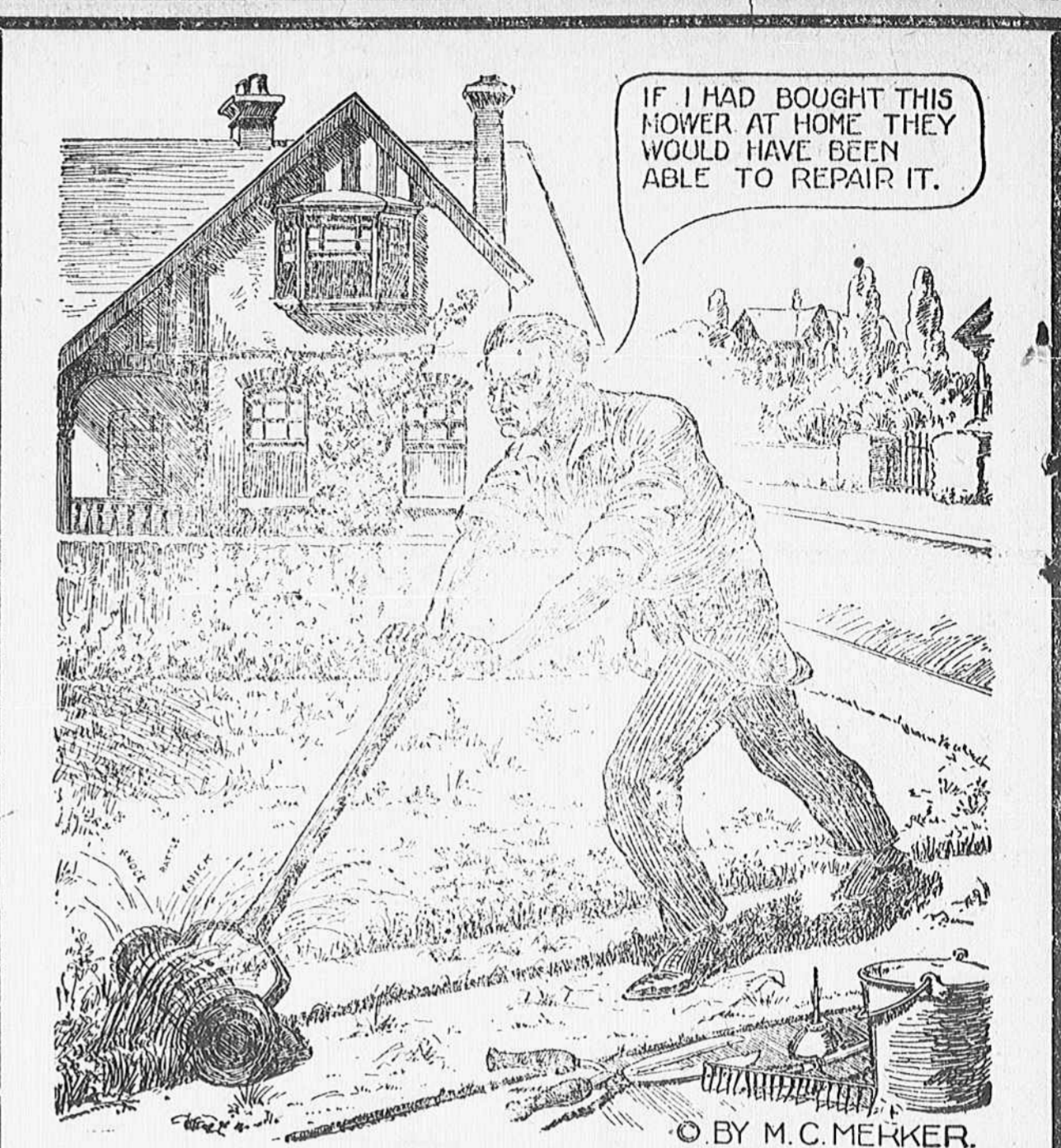

GUARDS IN SHOPS BRING ON STRIKE
All Service Tied Up When Trainmen Quit. Other Men Return.
 Atlanta, Ga., Aug. 13.—An outstanding development in the general rail strike situation in the South tonight was the complete tie-up, reported from Birmingham, of passenger, freight and mail traffic on the St. Louis & San Francisco railroad, occasioned by the walkout of trainmen there yesterday which union leaders stated was caused by the presence of armed guards in shops.
 Postoffice authorities at Birmingham stated that though mails were experiencing no delay as they have been transferred to other routes.
 The lines affected run from Birmingham to Memphis.
 At Memphis the night train on the Frisco, running to Birmingham, was annulled. The roads trainmen in that city have not walked out but met tonight to determine their action.
 As a protest against the employment of armed guards and non-union workmen in the Louisville & Nashville railroad shops at Corbin, Ky., trainmen on the Cumberland valley division were reported to have planned to walk out at 10 o'clock tomorrow morning.
 On the other hand it was reported from Meridian, Miss., that switchmen, hostlers and yard crews of the Southern Railway system and the Mobile & Ohio had returned to work after agreement had been reached with the two companies.
 B. M. Starks, general manager of the Louisville & Nashville road, announced that engineers and firemen on the Henderson division, who had been on strike since Friday, have returned to work.
