man's normal condition, peace and
good order are only cultivated things—
the evil results of a too highly
cultivated civilization.
I thought at the close of my last
week's letter that we were approaching
an era of peace, but I had hardly got
my letter in the mail, when I discovered

I met an old member of Plymouth
church, one whose orthodoxy,
