#### OUR NEW CLERK.

#### WHAT IS NEWBERRY GOING TO

The C. N. & L. and Glenn Springs Railroads have been consolidated subject to the confirmation of the stockholders, which will doubtless be done. The Townships of No. 9. Broad River, Saluda and Fork have voted their subscriptions; the road has been surveyed to Newberry, the line running about a mile east of the city; contractors are grading the road from Broad River toward Prosperity; Columbia Township is moving to subscribe forty thousand dollars to build the bridge across Broad River; Nos. 2 and 3 have ordered an election for the purpose of subscribing twenty thousand dollars to the Glenn Springs portion, which is a part of this, and Newberry is still silent.

The natural route for the road is by Newberry, but this road has been brought thus far without much aid from No. 1. Township, and as Prosperity has an eye to all the advantages and business that Newberry does not want, the road might be built without touching Newberry or a subscription from the Township, and it might be well for Newherry to decide what she is going to do about it.

GENERAL The express train consisting of a locomotice, baggage car, postal car, two sleeping coaches, which left White River dustering around somewhere.

Judge Hair's noted horse is advancing filled with passengers from Boston and notoriety, and is now somewhat approaching the standard of a Texas pony. It bucks, and can pitch a darkey over crossing of White River, a rail broke. Junction on the night of the 5th inst. car broke away from the rest of the train, passing on the bridge in safety. The rest of the train was thrown from the tails and continued on the road bed until it came near the end of the bridge, but then it ran over an abutment, and all of the ears fell into White River, some fifty feet below. The coaches caught fire and the passengers were burned, most of them beyond recognition. More than fifty lives were lost.

CONGRESSIONAL. Senator Evarts introduced a bill to confirm the titles of settlers of land purchased from government land agents of Florida prior to 1883, and lying with in the indomnity limits of the lands set apart for the Florida Railway and Nav-igation Company, provided the lands were purchased in good faith and taxes issessed against them.

Mr. McAdoo, of New Jersey, introduced a bill in the House to provide for th manufacture of first-class modern guns for the navy and sea cost defences. In the Senate on Thursday last Mr. Sulisbury speaking of the civil service said: That while he would not convert President Cleveland into a butcher, decapitating every office holder hostile to him, he would instruct him that it was his duty which he owed to himself, his administration, the party which elected bim and the country which he served, to purge the department of men hostile to his administration and unless he did so he would not have a successful ad-ministration. Senator Morgan said: He agreed with the Senator from Dela-ware that the President mistook his opportunities for success, and was put very much in peril when he deliberately left the conduct of public affairs in the hands of his enemies. He hoped that the President and the heads of depart-ments would take warning, and not let themselves and their administration be brought into the disgrace by the treachery of subordinates, and that it was not a wise policy of the part of the administration to keep its enemies in office, and he referred to Jameson, chief of the railroad mail service as a Republican, who had under him four thousand four nundred employees with salaries from \$1,800 to \$800.
