BOSTON, March 14.—A terrible accident occurred this morning on the Dedham branch of the Boston and Providence Railroad, between Forest Hill and Rosindale, at what is known as Bussey Park Bridge.

DASHED TO DEATH.

Horrible Accident on the Boston and Providence Railroad.

BOSTON, March 14.—A terrible accident occurred this morning on the Dedham branch of the Boston and Providence Railroad, between Forest Hill and Rosindale, at what is known as Bussey Park Bridge.

It is stated that the bridge is comparatively a new one, and that the accident was caused by a truck on one of the cars giving away, causing the car to strike against an abutment of the bridge.

The bodies of the dead have all been removed. Some of the wounded are at the hospital and some have been taken home, so that it is very difficult to ascertain their names and the extent of their injuries at the present time.

Among the killed are Conductor Tilden, Sergeant Naylor, of the West Roxbury Division of the Boston police, W. E. Snow, Alice Barnett, of Rosindale, Mabel Adams and Frank Norris, of Dedham, Harry Gay, mortally injured and dying, among the injured are Frank Plummer, Nellie Palmer, Mrs. Ames, George Lord, L. A. Carr, Mrs. Lipincott, Cassie Smithers.

Some of the injured are at the hospital and some have been taken home, so that it is very difficult to ascertain their names and the extent of their injuries at the present time.

The officers of the road are present and are doing all they can. Many doctors are there, doing everything in their power.

The men at the head of it mean business and say there is now no doubt of its construction, as ample capital can easily be obtained.
