siding: The Grand Jury would beg to submit the following as their report to the July term. We have carefully considered all bills handed out by the honorable Solicitor and returned the same.

Having made a full examination of all the offices and public buildings at our former session, we have not done so at this term but will do so at our next meet

Only five of the Trial Justices of the county have submitted their dockets for inspection. These we find correctly and in the main neatly kept, having all needed entrys properly made. As the law requires all Trial Justices to hand their books to the Grand Jury for inspection, they should be required to show cause why they fail to do so.

No complaints have been made, as to the condition of the public roads of the county. We believe that interest of the public would be better subserved if there was a law requiring the public roads should not be worked prior to the 20th of March in each year, unless some erigency should; arise making it necessary that they should be worked at some other time. The heavy winter rains are generally over by the middle of March leaving the land in a better condition to

be worked, than in the months before that The thanks of this jury and town are due G. M. Girardeau, Trial Justice for his promptness in carrying out the suggestion in our last report in regard to vagrants, by having them arrested, and we are informed that there is much more that might be yet done in that way.
