We have taken the liberty to say what kind of bagging it shall be wrapped in. But some of the cotton exchanges have said it will not be received in the cotton bagging. If it is not put up in jute it will probably have to be sold at a sacrifice to the farmers. Now, fellow farmers, if there is not some way lin which to pluck out that kind of middle men, we would just as well throw up our hands and quit. T. J. W.

NOTES FROM EXCELSIOR.


