SHOCKING RAILROAD ACCIDENT.

Death of Mr. John G. Pitts Last Monday, on the C. & G. R. R., Near Newberry.

Mr. John Pitts is dead. Swift as with an arrow did the hurtling shaft hurl the old man into eternity. He never quivered. His death was instantaneous and therefore pain-

The following are the particulars of the shocking accident which occurred on Monday morning at Boyd's, below the Kilgore Hill, about twenty minutes past eight o'clock.

Mr. William Pitts, section-master between Helena and Prosperity, with whom his father worked, started his crank with the force of hands very cautionsly through the prevailing fog, stopping at times to be assured of his safety. He stopped five times. He did not know that a special freight train was running westward. He is one of the most industrious and reliable section-masters on the road, as well

on the alert. Just before he stopped for the last time he saw what he supposed was a body of men. It was saleday and he had passed a number of men on their Christian Association over the store of way to the village. The distance was 17 06-100 acres, to the same for \$275; about 600 yards, and to his great surprise in a moment more he found that it was an engine rapidly approaching through the mist without head-light. Neither did it blow brakes on him, Mr. Pitts affirms, which would have retarded the engine one minute, at


