The very flattering vote received by Mr. Johnstone was by force of his ability and capacity. Newberry did nicely by him last Friday, but on to-morrow she ought to do even more.

We do not advocate sticking to a county man simply because he is a county man, but when we have one in the race who has the ability and fitness, we say stick to him.

The editor of this paper has not been a personal friend of Mr. Johnstone for some years, but we are willing to lay that aside, and would like to see him receive the nomination.

Mr. Norris may have the ability, but it has not been demonstrated, and he has no experience.

If the South really needs men in the next Congress, as she certainly does, we believe in having some county pride, and then we want a man of ability in Congress as our representative.

He has not, however, had the opportunity to prove his abilities or his purposes, and so far as our information goes, he has not during this campaign or at any time before it, given any evidence of remarkable talent or knowledge of independence of thought.

Another amusing feature of the race is the bidding of the Alliance voter, who does the bidding of a few, to caucuses. It is really a mystery to what the relation of certain voters is to caucuses and how they look at them and what they think of them.

"More than 4,000 sturdy Democrats most of whom would resent with a blow any suggestion of being a bolt in the ranks of the party, have declared in advance that their convictions of his duty will lead him to bolt his party caucus if it does not go, his way on certain questions. The humor of the situation is further heightened by the evident fact that a large number of those voters were cast in obedience to the demand or suggestion of an Alliance caucus. Men who are themselves bolted by a party primary voted against their natural personal and political preferences."

Senator Butler arrived in the city this morning. He had heard that the two executive committees would meet to-day, and he came to assist.

"It is not prudent or wise or proper," replied he, "to have a split or a bolt, whether the action of the convention be Republican or Democratic."

"What do our representatives in Congress have to say to it?" "Every Democratic senator," said the General, "with whom I have conversed, concurs with me in the views I have expressed to you."

Senator Butler said that he had been asked for his views by the Anti-Tillman advisory committee, and that he had given it as his opinion that the ticket nominated by the September convention should be supported by the entire Democratic party.
