We find him a busy little Jew, greedily devouring the rich intellectual repast prepared for him by the learned Gamaliel. He was full of the fire of fanaticism. As a Jew, he was the straitest of the Pharisees; as a Roman, according to the law, he demanded his rights in the franchise. He did nothing by halves. As a Jewish churchman he despised Christianity, and pursued and persecuted its followers with an untiring and relentless hatred, thinking he was doing God's service. Hence it is easy to perceive that when converted the fanatic gave place to the aroused,
