THE STRIKER OF BILLY PATTERSON The Question Likely Settled and Two Georgians will Get the Reward of \$1,000.

[From the Globe-Democrat.] CARNESVILLE, Ga., March 21.—The public mind has been in doubt as to who struck Billy Patterson ever since that wonderful document, his will, was made and put upon the record...

ELECTIONS IN VARIOUS STATES. Results at the Polls in Many Cities of the West and South.

Here are condensed results of Tuesday's elections in a number of States: Illinois—In Springfield the Democrats won all the offices except the Mayor (R. D. Lawrence, Rep., elected) and three out of seven Aldermen; at Galesburg the license party was a walk-over; the Democrats carried Alton and Kankakee; the Republicans carried Princeton, Tuscola, Bloomington, Woodstock, Mattson, and Decatur; El Paso elected a Democratic Mayor; Belleville Democratic; East St. Louis Democratic.

Wisconsin—In Janesville the Independent candidate for Mayor won. In Manitowish the Republicans elected the Mayor and the Democrats a majority of the City Council. In Racine the Republicans won. Oconomowoc elected a Democratic Mayor and Assessor, the Republicans capturing the other offices. Beloit Republicans won on a no-license platform. La Crosse Republicans elected their Mayor, the Democrats getting everything else. In Eau Claire the Independent candidate for Mayor was elected, the Democrats taking the other offices. The Madison Democrats won; so did the Oshkosh Democrats.

Minnesota—At Stillwater the Democrats elected the Mayor, E. W. Durant, and one Alderman; the Republicans, City Treasurer and two Aldermen; at Fergus Falls no license was beaten; Faribault, Republican.

South Dakota—Watertown elected a Democratic Mayor, the rest of the ticket being Republican. At Huron the Republicans elected everything except Police Magistrate.

Missouri—The next Assembly is Democratic. The Democrats elected their entire ticket for the St. Louis City Council; Independence Democratic; Mexico Democratic, except one Alderman; Windsor Democratic; Boonville Republican.

At Clinton offices equally divided between the old parties: Aurora Republican; Nevada Democratic; Badalia Democratic; Warrensburg Republican. The Democrats of St. Joseph elected four of eight Aldermen.

Nebraska—In Hastings the Republicans made a clean sweep. Kansas—The Republicans carried by a small majority, Kansas City by a greatly reduced majority, Atchison, Ottawa, Clay Centre, Garden City, Lawrence, Holton, Great Bend, Eureka, and Beloit. Leavenworth and Wichita were carried by the Democrats, but by a greatly reduced majority. Abilene, Yates Centre, and Arkansas City elected the Citizens' Alliance tickets. In Dodge City the Anti-Prohibition ticket was elected; Emporia, Republican; Fort Scott, Citizens' Alliance; Ottawa elected candidates from each of the tickets. With the exceptions of Kansas City, Topeka, and Leavenworth, the woman vote was very light. They manifested the greatest interest at Topeka, where a proposition was submitted to vote \$300,000 in bonds for the deficit in the county expenses of the school fund, which received the united support of the women. Out of a total registered vote of 2,740 women, 2,300 voted.

Colorado—Denver elected a Democratic Mayor for the first time, Rogers, the next Mayor receiving 12,698 votes; the Democrats won at Central City and Grand Junction; at Colorado Springs the Republicans elected the Mayor, and the Council is divided; Leadville elected C. Fouts (Rep.) by 652 majority, and the rest of the Republican ticket by smaller majorities; the Democrats carried everything in Trinidad.

Arkansas—Little Rock and twenty other towns elected Democratic officers. New Mexico—At Albuquerque the Republicans elected the Mayor and five of the eight Aldermen. California—In San Diego the Republicans made a clean sweep.

The Irish Ether Drinkers. [From the London Times.] The Committee on British and Foreign Spirits dealt with the question of ether drinking in Ireland a few days ago. Mr. Carter, the Protestant rector of Cookstown, was the first witness.

He stated that the practice of ether drinking had prevailed in his district which comprised an area of nearly forty square miles, for about thirty years. The people preferred ether to whisky, because it was cheaper and more effective. They first of all took a small quantity of water, then a modicum of ether, holding their noses while they drank it, and then they drank water afterward. They did not take it by inhalation, but by actual drinking. An ordinary dose was about two pennyworth, which would be nearly half a glass, and intoxication would be produced by that almost immediately. It aroused combative instincts, and also produced a high state of exhilaration accompanied by shouting and singing and the use of provocative words. A great many people would come to market and make themselves drunk the whole day for six days. They would take a dose of ether at 10 o'clock, another at 1 o'clock, and another perhaps at 4 o'clock, two pennyworth each time, and that would keep them in a state of intoxication the whole day. Beggars women carried about ether in their pockets, and exchanged it with the country people for eggs. The children were so much accustomed to it that they were not repelled by its unpleasant taste. They frequently came to school smelling of ether, and it was found that they got it in the way described. In his district ether drinking was not a rarity, but a common practice, and it was on the increase. It is not true to say that ether drinking prevailed most among Roman Catholics.
