THE REPLY OF THE REGENTS. They Defend Their Administration of Asylum Affairs.

The Regents of the Asylum have prepared the following reply to the resolutions upon the management of the institution by the legislative committee of investigation in their recent report.

"The committee appointed by the Legislature in December last to examine into and report upon the condition and management of the Lunatic Asylum, has completed its work, and made its report to the Chief Executive of the State. Inasmuch as this report brings several charges directly against the Board of Regents, we deem it proper in the outset to state the fact that the inquiry was made by the committee without notice to us, without any intimation to us that we were to be put on trial, and consequently with no opportunity given us, or any of the officers in charge of the institution of rebuttal. It was entirely an ex-parte proceeding, where witnesses were examined in private.

"The report with the charges therein contained, has gone in a semi-official form, before the people of the State, through the newspapers of the day. "After an examination of such portions of the testimony taken by the legislative committee as has now just been submitted to us by the Governor, we find that in a large number of cases the witnesses giving the most unfavorable testimony were either discharged attendants or employees having some fancied grievance to avenge. The two principal charges against the board proper are: First, a failure to meet as often as their rules require; and second, a lax performance of their duty when such meetings are held.

"The first charge we positively assert to be without foundation in fact. The rules of the board require monthly meetings and our records will show that since the passage of the law ten years ago there has been no single instance of our failure to meet as required. But few instances have occurred in which every member was not present, and in every such case the absence was prevented from attending by sickness or other unavoidable cause. True, every ward is not visited at every meeting, the largely increased size of the asylum rendering this a work of too much magnitude for one day's performance, the rule of our board being that at the conclusion of each meeting the board appoints committees of two to inspect the different portions of the entire institution, and our records show in the reports of said committees that a large portion of the building is regularly inspected by us, and the testimony of the witnesses before the legislative committee goes to show that those portions unvisited were always in proper condition, the purpose, therefore, of the inspection having been as fully accomplished by the known uncertainty as though the examination had been made. Only a very few instances have occurred in which the examination was entirely postponed or omitted, and these omissions were caused by the press of more important matters.

"Besides all this the executive regent for the current month, resident in Columbia, has invariably in the discharge of his duty visited and inspected, once or twice each month, the entire buildings and grounds as is clearly shown by his reports in our minutes. "In a prudential point of view it is manifestly improper for strangers to intrude in those wards where the more violent patients are confined, the very presence of strangers tending to cause undue excitement and thus to interfere with the proper treatment and to retard the cure.

"As to the matter of improper food the simple fact is that our contract for beef, which is furnished on alternate days, is made with a bonded contractor who stipulates to furnish good merchantable beef and we know the fact that the authorities in immediate charge do reject it when it fails below the proper standard. "The preponderance of the testimony together with our own knowledge, fully establishes the fact that the food provided has been good, palatable and sufficient. To show the truth of this statement we refer to the bills of articles purchased on file in the office of our steward. We have frequently examined the food in the kitchen and on the tables and have invariably found it good, well prepared and served, and the dining rooms particularly neat and clean.

"PATIENTS WELL CARED FOR. "Pay patients do receive better accommodations and greater variety of food than is furnished to the non-pay inmates and we apprehend that no one will deny that this is just and proper. "A difference also is made in the cases of the sick or delicate and those in possession of health and full physi-

cal strength. That the non-pay patients, however, are well cared for we appeal to the

MANAGEMENT OF THE FARM. "The severest criticisms against the board is as to the management of the farm. The Legislative committee base their charges on the testimony of only two witnesses, one a former employee who was discharged for cause several years ago, the other witness being the present superintendent of the farm who was elected by us in October last, and who has been in charge of the farm ever since, with instructions from us to do all in his power to improve the efficiency of the same. "As long ago as November last the superintendent of the farm was instructed to proceed with the erection of a new barn and stable, and proper appropriation was made by us for the work. Various causes have arisen to prevent the earlier completion of these needed improvements. As a proof of

THE VALUE OF THE FARM as an adjunct of the asylum and in refutation of the evidence submitted to the committee, we herewith append the monthly reports of the superintendent of the farm from November last to the present date, which shows a net profit of \$948.30."

"In reference to the charges more directly affecting the Superintendent and officers immediately in charge of the institution, we have placed the testimony in their hands and have given them a week to prepare their answer and report to the board."

He Talks to the Sunday School Class of the Young Men's Christian Association. WASHINGTON, April 20.—Justice Lamar of the Supreme Court appeared in a new role yesterday as a lecturer before the Sunday afternoon class of the Young Men's Christian Association. The announcement that he was to speak attracted a large crowd to the lecture room, drawn there as much from curiosity to see the ex-Senator, who appears so seldom in public, as to learn his religious belief, a subject upon which he rarely talks, even to his most intimate friends.

To many persons in yesterday's audience the changed appearance of the eminent Southern statesman was a shock. He has aged very perceptibly in the past few years, and is now a thin, stoop-shouldered man, with fleshless cheeks, to which the skin hangs in folds; long thin gray hair, claw-like hands, and a general air of feebleness. His talk to the young men yesterday was a most interesting one, delivered in a solemn and impressive manner almost suggestive of divine inspiration.

Justice Lamar dwelt upon three occasions in his life when he had listened to religious addresses which had made a deep and lasting impression upon his mind. In after years, when he had been perplexed and oppressed, the recollections of the words of Christian faith uttered on those occasions had come to him and given him strength. He had a hesitancy about speaking publicly of his personal experiences, but he always desired to show his colors, and he would simply add that he believed there was a God, who was infinitely great and merciful, and he believed in His holiness, justice, and goodness. The Justice closed his address by reading a portion of a chapter of St. Paul.

A Yellow Fever Ship at Pensacola. PENSACOLA, Fla., April 18.—The British bark Curlew, which arrived yesterday from Rio Janeiro, had on board eighteen cases of yellow fever. Four deaths occurred during the passage. The vessel was ordered to sea, the health board deciding that it would be dangerous to have the ship remain here.

NO PERPETUAL MOTION PATENTS. Why the Government Stopped Taking the Fees of the Cranks.

[From the Globe-Democrat.] The Patent Office has recently ceased to be a party to the fraud of perpetual motion. Until three years ago it was customary to take "first fees" (\$15) from the perpetual motion cranks as well as from all other would-be inventors. Then, in course of time, a letter was sent to the perpetual motion applicant telling him that his claim was based upon an irrational principle, and that he must furnish a working model. Of course, that was the end of the application. The model never came, and the fee remained in the Treasury.

About three years ago Principal Examiner William L. Aughinbaugh went to the Commissioner and suggested that, as rejection of the perpetual motion claim was inevitable, it would be fairer to refuse the first fees of such claimants and to send them a circular immediately upon the filing of their applications telling them that no consideration would be given their papers until a working model was filed. This course has been pursued ever since. But repeatedly the discoverer of perpetual motion has been very indignant at the rejection of his tendered fee. One way that has been adopted by the cranks to get around the new rule intended for their benefit is to drop the claim of perpetual motion and put in the drawings for a "motor." Notwithstanding the policy of the Patent Office to discourage the perpetual motion craze and to save time and money for people, at least two or three claims of this character are put in every month.

Not long ago a Kansas man claimed to have set up the perpetual motion machine, and to have it in operation at his home. He wrote to the Patent Office to know if the affidavit of Senator Plumb would be accepted instead of the working model as the basis for a patent. The examiner felt obliged to refuse. Sometimes the perpetual motion inventor appears with a pocket full of bearings and connections which he asks the examiner to accept as evidence that he has solved the problem. But the examiner insists that he must see the perpetual motion before he grants the patent.

Last summer a New York lawyer named Todd came all the way to Washington with parts of a machine, and had quite a controversy with the office because the patent was refused. He insisted that he had seen the machine in operation, that it was running day after day and keeping a cider press going to boot. There was no deviating from the rule. The lawyer went back to New York, saying that he would produce the machine. He was not seen again until the centennial celebration this week, when he reminded the examiner of the case and told how he had been fooled. At the time of making application the lawyer really believed that his client had discovered the long-sought principle. But when he got back to New York and told that the patent had been refused the client confessed. The perpetual motion was no motion at all. Power was concealed in the cider press. It ran the press and the press made the perpetual motion machine go, too. The inventor had been charging 10 cents admission to see perpetual motion. He had fooled the public and his lawyer, and he hoped to slip through a claim.
