HOW ABOUT THE REAL ESTATE. The railroad also owns 59 acres in No. Township, mostly in Helena. This is charged separately on the the tax books and is not passed upon by the railroad board of assessers, but by the county board, and no increase was made in it. In the case of the bank a separate tender of the taxes was made by the bank for its real estate and its other property and the treasurer accepted taxes for the real estate on the bank as he would have done from the railroad if it had been offered separately. Why the railroad did not pay on the real estate we do not know, unless it was overlooked, as the amount is very small. value of the real estate is only \$710. The treasurer does not understand this restraining order as relating to the real estate, and will proceed to issue his execution against that property at once. It will likely be some time before the
