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THREE MORE CONVENTIONS.

Meeting of County Executive Committee. They seem anxious to further divide the Democratic voters.

The resolution was adopted. The principal object of the meeting seemed to be the election of the appropriate delegates to have in charge the work in this county during the campaign.

The Board of Health was requested to have published again the ordinance requiring the registry of all deaths and burials, and that the same be strictly enforced.

The old board recommended that council appoint a health officer who should be required to inspect the premises in each ward once each week from the first of April for six months, and that he be paid \$25 a month; and that for the other six months inspect once a month and be paid \$10 a month.
