'To the Town Council of Newberry, "Gentlemen: I beg to hand you herewith my resignation as Mayor of Newberry and to ask that you accept the same. I have moved to Richmond and expect to make it my home, and in consequence this action on my part becomes necessary.

NATIVE OF NEWBERRY President Cleveland's Secretary of the

Navy Was Born in Old Mollohon.

Col. Hillary A. Herbert was born in 1834 in Newberry County, most likely in the Mollohon section, and not in Laurens as has been stated. His parents moved here, however, in his babyhood and the first ten or twelve years of his life, the days when he was a "barefoot boy" in summer and hunted rabbits

with the darkies in winter, were spent

in Laurens.

He is said to have been a fat, chubby little fellow, with a handsome face and an unusually big head. People spoke of him as that "big headed little boy." A lady tells me "that he was exceed ingly fond of dogs and girls." young ladies at his mother's boarding house were constantly making much of him and he did not fail to reciprocate their attentions even though he had

not then entered his teens. He was cheery and bright but was student from the first. "He was a striking boy" says Dr. Barksdale, "who by his brightness and deportment at tracted notice wherever he went. He got started exactly right,-and it seems that he has been keeping on in that

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


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
