THE PRIMARY ELECTION. A. Schumpert for Ward 2—G. A. Langford for Ward 4.—The Election Friday.

Newberry has had two elections during the past week and yet we still survive. These were only primaries, however, and we are accustomed to primary elections now.

There were two candidates for Mayor and five for Aldermen. Dr. E. C. Jones and Mr. D. B. Wheeler were the candidates for Mayor; and from Ward 2, E. Cabanis and from Ward 4, A. Schumpert were in the race; and from Ward 4, the candidates were G. A. Langford, W. H. Harris and E. H. Aull. The vote on the first election stood: For Mayor—The Joneses 178; D. B. Wheeler 60. For Alderman Ward 2—F. A. Schumpert 133, and E. Cabanis 132. For Alderman Ward 4—G. A. Langford 129, W. H. Harris 43, and E. H. Aull 89.

The election passed off quietly. The election will serve for the unexpired term of their predecessors, or until the next general election, which, under the amended charter, will be in December. The election will be held Friday.

County Board of Equalization. The County Board of Equalization held a meeting in the Auditor's office yesterday for the purpose of going over the returns and hearing complaints. There were very few complaints and but for the matter of the Bank's return the board would have been in session but a short time. It does seem a little strange that this particular class of property should be singled out but such is the case.

The National Bank of Newberry had returned its property at \$150,000. The Savings Bank had made its return at \$120,000. It seems, as stated above that the board looked upon these two classes of property as the only ones that it was their business to look after, and all of their time was taken up in discussing these two returns.

After recess it was decided to raise the National Bank's return \$20,000, making the assessment or valuation \$140,000; and to raise the assessment of the Savings Bank \$2,700, putting its valuation at \$14,700.

The act of the last Legislature would seem that the Auditor has power to increase the assessment, even after it has been passed upon by the Board of Equalization, but whether Auditor Cromer will increase it or let it stand as the board has put it, we are unable to say. Full power is given the Auditor to set independent of what rights are conferred upon the Board of Equalization by the act.

The board was in session all day. All the Townships were represented except No. 7. The following were present: No. 1, M. Speers; No. 2, Thos. W. Kelt; No. 3, W. B. Oxner; No. 4, M. A. Reunick; No. 5, T. H. Chalmers; No. 6, J. R. Spearman; No. 8, I. H. Soule; No. 9, R. T. C. Hunter; No. 10, L. Q. Fellers; No. 11, E. O. Hentz.

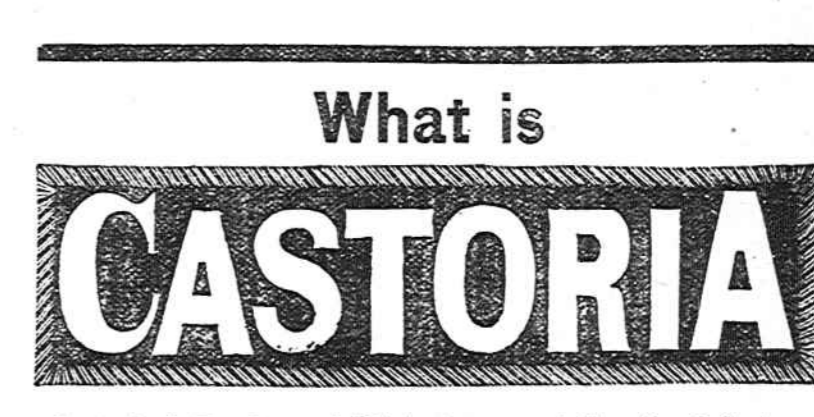
