The county board of control for Newberry County held a meeting last Friday and appointed R. C. Maybin the dispenser of liquors for this place.

The board held its session with closed doors, or rather would not let but one person appear before them at a time.

Several persons had requested that their names be taken from the petition, and in some cases R. C. Maybin had been given notice before the petition, was filed, and in one case he had promised to take the name off, but the petition was filed with all the names on it.
