The cost of pumping the water out of the well with a deep well pump is but a trifle more than pumping it from a reservoir or tank; and then you can get twice the quantity of water with a deep well pump. I mean by this that I can put a deep well pump in any flowing well in the South and get twice the quantity of water that the well will ever flow. And then another reason why I prefer a pumping well to a flowing well for system of water works—the water from a flowing well must be discharged into a reservoir or tank at the well. It is then subjected to all the impurities of the atmosphere, dust and other matter, before it is forced into the water main for distribution, while with a pumping well the water is forced direct through the mains to the residences without being exposed even to the atmosphere until it is drawn from the faucet inside your house, all connections from the inside your house, all connections from th bottom of the well to the faucet in the house being made so tight that a grain of dust cannot enter the water until it leaves
