Rev. G. R. Mosley, a returned Baptist missionary from Mexico, delivered an interesting address to the Baptist Sunday-school last Sunday afternoon. He gave an insight into the manners and customs of the Mexicans and the intolerance of the State Church and its priesthood. It will be remembered that Rev. Mosley himself experienced something of the latter, as he was arrested in Saltillo at the instigation of the priests, who threatened and published garbled extracts from a tract he circulated in the United States regarding the intolerance of the State Church. He was kept in jail eight days and released through the intervention of the United States Consul. The night before he was arrested a train on which he was traveling was stopped by a man who expressed Mr. Mosley to make his way from Mexico. He returned to this country in August and expects to go back to Mexico, where he has accomplished much good work. He is a very earnest speaker and an aggressive worker.

The Big Reservoir. The Newberry Cotton Mills is having a large cistern dug at the mill in the rear of the Southern Railway freight depot. It is said the cistern will hold 2,000,000 gallons of water. Mayer and Gilder, who gave their views. These gentlemen will reduce their opinions on the subject to writing and file with the board in a few days. What has been done all the facts will come out.
