THE TURKO-GRECIA WAR.

We deprecate war and with St. Paul would prefer, if possible, to live in peace, because, as General Sherman says, "war is hell."

It did seem, until recently, that patriotism had "played" and was passing along with hero worship. But the spirit of Leonidas has returned to the Pass of Thermopylae—this time against Islam, and the splendid valor of Marathon again displayed in the rout of the Turkish invader.

The Turk might have remained in Europe unmolested had he not persistently carried out his creed of exterminating the Christian "dog!"

But for Turkish bonds placed in Europe, and the jealous rivalries of the so-called leading Christian nations, the deplorable and unblushing spectacle of "thrones and presses" and combined navies cooing Greece, might never have been witnessed.

The sophistry of those who declared that intervention for peace might precipitate greater trouble, is disproved by the quiet but determined action of England's great premier, Mr. Gladstone, in 1880, when with help of the then Czar of Russia, Turkey was forced to disgorge some of her stolen territory without war.

There is one phase of the question involving possible contingencies of interest to us and that is our productions. In the event of war Europe will make very large drafts upon us for food supplies.
