

Death of Mrs. Amanda Davis.

To Editor The Herald and News:-I is with sincere regret that we pen the sad news of the death of Mrs. Amanda Davis, nee West, which occurred at the home of her son, in Newberry, on the 8th May, 1897. She was born February 18th, 1846. Aged 51 years, 2 months and 20 days.

The funeral services were conducted by Rev. Mr. Wright, after which the remains were carried to Helena and reverently laid beside the long deceased husband. She was a noble-hearted Christian lady and I think a member of the Baptist church. How sad it is to have the noble old land marks depart from amongst us.
