The thorough hypocrisy that forces upon this section a color of official life that would not be tolerated in its own land must be rebuked by the solid ballots of the people it has insulted.

We have dallied much with political possibility during these tranquil and seemingly economic times. We have speculated upon division, and looked upon new alignments without alarm. But the black flag has been lifted by the old party of sectionalism, the glare of the enemy's bugles has flung in our faces the most serious threat of mortal politics.

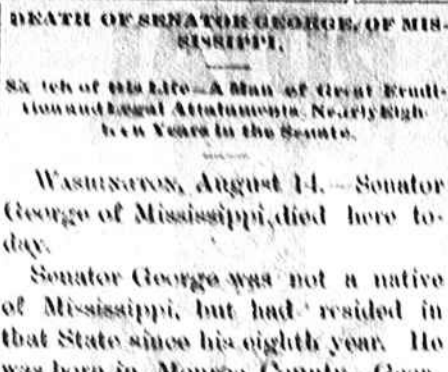
