THE SALUDA BRIDGES.

The Saluda Advocate figures down to a nicely the conditions on which it will favor the building of some steel bridges across the Saluda.

It wants the citizens who are directly and immediately interested and near the river to subscribe three-fifths of the amount, and then it will favor helping out of the county funds for the erection of the bridges, Saluda's portion.

We understand that a good private subscription has already been raised for this purpose.

But why should the citizens who receive immediate and direct benefits from these bridges be asked to contribute out of their individual pockets?

There are no doubt some bridges in other parts of the county built out of the public funds, which are of direct benefit to the citizens who live near them and which in all probability will never be used by the people who want the bridges over Saluda. These citizens were not asked to help build these bridges out of their private pockets.

Then why should the people near Saluda river be asked to do it? It is alright if the people who want the bridges across Saluda are willing to help pay for them, but there is no sense or reason or justice in laying down a condition precedent that they must put up a certain proportion before the county will do anything to help them.

There are bridges on Enoree river and Indian creek in this county that were built out of the general fund and that are no immediate benefit to the people on the Saluda side, but the Saluda people did not object to the building of them.

It is true this is a fine bridge, but what matters that if each county bears its proportion of the cost.

The bridges should be built and we hope the County Commissioners of both counties will not lay down any specified amount to be raised by private subscription without which the counties will not build them.

The convenience and expense of ferrage of these people who want these bridges should be considered as well as others, for they pay their proportion of the taxes and help to keep up and build bridges in other parts of the counties.

Get what private subscription you can but go ahead and build the bridges and remove the barrier which separates the two counties and bring us closer together, socially and commercially. It will help the people of both counties.

THE O. P. HOUSES.

All the railroads in the State have refused to receive whiskey from the original package dealers unless it is put up in wooden boxes; Bluthenthal and Beakart, of Atlanta, brought suit before Judge Newman in the United States Court to require the Southern to receive such freight. The final hearing of the case will not come up until 9th of October.

The Southern lays down two requirements. It must first be an original package and then it must be securely packed so as not to be subject to breakage.

One O. P. dealer in Newberry received his first lot in wooden boxes. Two got them in paper casings and the other fellow hauled his lot through from North Carolina in a wagon. The others will likely haul future supplies in wagons. They say they can do it very nearly as cheap as the freight charges.

It is only a few months until the Legislature meets when something will have to be done with the law. As we said before, however, the members of the Legislature have as widely divergent views as there are members, but possibly out of the multitude of counselors something good may come. Let us hope so. The State is now in better frame of mind to look at the matter sensibly.

A NECESSITY.

The Newberry Herald and News in advocating sewerage for Newberry refers to the sewerage system of Greenville and comments on the fine water of Greenville. No town in South Carolina has water and sewerage systems which compare with those of Greenville and Greenville's fine reputation spreads. Money for sewerage is money well spent. Indeed, a good system of sewerage is a necessity to any well regulated town. Greenville News.

We submit this from a town that tried to get along without sewerage. It is a necessity to the health of any town that has reached the size of Newberry. We should have it and have it as soon as we can get it.

There is no use waiting. We had just as well make arrangements to go to work and build the system.

The County S. S. Convention.

Held its thirteenth annual convention in Lebanon church Thursday and Friday, September 23 and 24, 1897.

The convention was called to order at 11 a. m. by the president, Prof. Geo. B. Cromer, who led in the devotional exercises, reading a scripture lesson a portion of the 20th chapter of Acts.

On account of the inclemency of the weather there was not a large enrollment. During the two days there were present 6 ministers, 9 superintendents and 30 delegates.

Mr. Howell M. Henry delivered the address of welcome, and in the absence of Mr. G. J. Johnson, the secretary made the response.

The first topic discussed was Long preparation, opened by request of the president by Mr. Jefferson Quantelbaum and continued by Messrs. C. F. Boyd, J. J. Long, J. C. S. Brown and Geo. H. Cromer.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

On motion, the report of Sunday-schools was referred to the secretary to be tabulated. (All superintendents who failed to send their reports before the convention will do so at once, so they can be tabulated.)

Topic: Class work applied to International Lesson of October 3rd. In the absence of Professor Bowers, President Cromer very interestingly performed this work.

Topic: The use of the Bible in the Sunday-school—discussed by Messrs. J. J. Long, R. A. Abrams and others.

The convention adjourned with benediction by Student J. J. Long.

FRIDAY MORNING SESSION.

Devotional exercises conducted by the secretary, C. F. Boyd.

By request of Rev. E. P. McClintock, the first topic discussed was the training of teachers, its importance and feasibility. Opened by Rev. E. P. McClintock, followed by Messrs. W. K. Sligh, G. A. Wright and D. T. Tiller.

2nd topic: Normal work applied to International Lesson for October 10th—Taught by President Geo. B. Cromer.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

Topic: The lesson reviewed and applied before the school—opened by Rev. D. Tiller, followed by Messrs. W. K. Sligh, G. A. Wright and M. W. Rankin.

Topic: The claim of the Sunday-school on the congregation—opened by Rev. M. W. Rankin, followed by Messrs. W. K. Sligh, G. A. Wright and M. W. Rankin.

Query box opened containing four questions, as follows: 1st. Is it worth while to hold a session next year?—Answered yes by E. P. Cromer.

2nd. How can the pastor be induced to take more interest in the Sunday-school? By giving him the work to do. Answered by Rev. W. W. McMorries.

3rd. What should be done with a teacher who is careless and habitually tardy? He should be admonished and if continued careless, dismissed. Answered by Rev. G. A. Wright.

4th. Should questions in the helpers be asked in class recitation? Answered no by Rev. W. K. Sligh.

The following resolution was offered by Rev. W. K. Sligh and unanimously adopted: Resolved, That the executive committee be instructed to arrange for a two days' meeting of this convention next year and that the programme be arranged along the line of normal work. The old officers as follows were re-elected for next year: President, G. B. Cromer; 1st vice-president, E. P. Cromer; 2nd vice-president, E. H. Longshore; secretary, C. F. Boyd; treasurer, W. H. Hunt.
