An Ordinance

SECTION I. Be it ordained by the Mayor and Aldermen of the Town of Newberry, S. C., in council assembled and by the authority of the same. That t special tex of two and one-half mills o the dollar of all property (except the property of churches and institu-tions of learning) within the corporate limits of the Town of Newberry be and the same is hereby levied and ordered and required to be paid into the treasury of the said town, to provide the means wherewith to pay and olseharge the interest and one-fortieth of the principal of the bonds issued for the purpose of building and equipping a ystem of Water Works and Electric Lights for said town.

SEC. 2. That the said special tax herein levied shall be collected at the same time the general taxes of the said Town of Newberry are collected.

Sec. 3.
