#### GOV. ELLERBE MAKES A CHANGE IN THE STATE PRINTING.

The Work has Heretofore Been Done by the Register in the Name of Charles A. Calvo, Jr.—It is to be Done by the State in the Name of Mr. Charles B. Calvo—A Matter With an Inside History, Some of Which is Here Given and Some Not.

(News and Courier.)

Columbia, December 13. — Mr. Charles B. Calvo was today appointed public printer for the State of South Carolina. This announcement contains a rather curious and remarkable history. It bears largely upon private and personal matter which cannot well be related.

To let the matter be fully understood, Mr. Charles A. Calvo, Jr., was until the announcement of his son's appointment the State printer for the State. He had been regularly elected and filed his bond. Mr. Calvo was, and still is, nominal proprietor of the Columbia Register. About six months ago Mr. Calvo was taken seriously ill, and it was thought had lost his mind. He was taken to Baltimore, where he was treated in a sanitarium for his mental troubles. At this time Messrs. Henry Lindenmyer & Sons, wealthy paper dealers, under power of attorney, assumed control of the Register. Messrs. Lindenmyer & Sons gave Mr. Thomas Addison proper power of attorney, and he has been representing them in all matters relative to the Register. It was thought by the Register people that the public printing went with the power of attorney they held, and that they were entitled to go on with the public printing. In fact arrangements were being made for the printing. A few weeks ago Mr. Calvo returned to Columbia, and on his return here executed another power of attorney, this time to his wife. The claim was made that the public printing belonged to Mr. Charles A. Calvo, Jr., and that the second power of attorney revoked the first, and that, under this new power of attorney Mrs. Calvo could have the printing done wherever she pleased.

The matter was finally referred to Attorney General Barber for settlement as to the legal status. Governor Ellerbe today, in talking about the matter, said that Mr. Barber had decided that if Mr. Calvo were adjudged insane and regularly committed, the office of public printer would be vacated, and the printing committee would have to select a successor to the public printer. Since Mr. Calvo's return to Columbia those who have seen him professionally have regarded him as unfortunately in a serious condition, and he was adjudged by Drs. Taylor and Babcock to be insane. This action was followed by Mr. Calvo's commitment to the Asylum. According to the decision of the Attorney General the office of public printer was then vacated. The public printing committee,

which consists of Governor Ellerbe, Mr. A. Blythe, on the part of the House printing committee, and Senator McDaniel, on the part of the Senate printing committee, met today and elected Mr. Charles B. Calvo, the son of Mr. Charles A. Calvo, Jr., as public printer. It may be mentioned that, although the name of Mr. Calvo appears as proprietor of the Register, and he has been associated with it for many years, that family is not on friendly business terms with the present management.

It was stated that the work for the State would be done by the State Company, and with a view of getting at the facts, Mr. Ambrose E. Gonzales, president of the company, was seen, and he said: "Mr. Charles B. Calvo has arranged with the State Company to carry out his contract with the State of South Carolina. It is a plain business transaction between the State Company and Mr. Calvo." Mr. Charles B. Calvo has offered a gilt-edge bond for the faithful performance of the work, Messrs. Thos. J. Hurper and R. B. McKay having gone on the bond. The Register people announced that, through the kindness of Henry Lindenmyer & Sons, the family of Mr. Charles A. Calvo, Jr., has been receiving a weekly allowance of \$20. They also state that on Saturday afternoon this allowance was made and paid as usual.

The selection of Mr. Charles B. Calvo as public printer entitles him to all of the printing until a new contract or arrangement is made by the General Assembly, which meets in January. Mr. Reynolds now has a bill pending, under which the public printing hereafter should be awarded to the lowest bidder, and this measure will likely pass. The work will be continued at the rates in the Act by which Mr. Charles A. Calvo, Jr., was elected public printer. Everybody in the State will regret to know that Mr. Calvo has met with such a serious trouble, and all hope that he will recover and re-enter the battle of life, in which he took such an active part for many years. After the office of State printer had been declared vacant today Mr. Thomas Addison, editor and manager of the Register, made a formal application for the appointment. The public printing will begin at once.
