The Newberry Postoffice. The time is drawing near when the term of the present postmaster will expire. There are several applicants for the position. Who will be selected, of course, we do not know. There is one negro who is an applicant for the position and who, we are told, has been promised something by "Boss" Webster. The Herald and News is not fighting the cause of any of the applicants, though, of course, personally the editor has his choice.

What we want to say is that the appointment of a negro as postmaster at Newberry would meet a very warm protest from the citizens who are patrons of the office, and we hope for the sake of peace and good feeling among all classes in the town and among the patrons of the office that no such appointment will be made. It would be a very great mistake in the appointing power and also on the part of the colored applicant for him to accept the office.

Postmaster General Gentry should stick to his resolution, formerly published, not to appoint negro postmasters in the South. The Southern white people will treat the negro all right so long as he behaves himself and remains in his position. He will be protected in his rights of person and property, and will be encouraged to do what he can to better his condition, but he is not wanted as postmaster in towns the size of Newberry, nor even in smaller or larger towns.

As a friend and well wisher of the colored man who is said to be an applicant, we hope he will not accept the office if it is tendered him, but in the first place Mr. Webster would make a mistake to recommend his appointment.

QUARANTINE ESTABLISHED.

The County Board of Health Quarantines Against the Colored Colleges at Orangeburg.

The County Board of Health had application from some of the students at the State Colored College, at Orangeburg, to be permitted to come to their homes, but since a new case of small-pox has broken out there, and one more virulent than any heretofore, and inasmuch as the city of Orangeburg has raised the quarantine against the College, the Board of Health has established quarantine against both the colored colleges, and any one coming in the county from either college will be immediately arrested and put in the pest house for the required time.
