JAS. A. RISER AND HIS TWO SONS, AL-BERT AND WILLIE, FOUND GUILTY.

Hipp & Co's safe. Had it there for two or three years. At time I paid mortgage I had about \$125 or \$126. I put it there as safety as I am guardian for one or two of my nieces. I used it when I needed it. I use it and pay interest on it myself. Could not tell you how long it had been there. I thought you asked me how long I had been depositing money there. I did not care to use it because I did not know when I might be called on for it. My nieces are 10 years old and younger. When I used it I knew I could replace it mighty easily. When I gave mort-gage was in spring and did not use books of D. Hipp & Co. Money and did not use books of D it then for I was afraid could not replace it.
