The Latest War News.

(Special to Herald and News.)

Columbin, S. C., May 23.—No news from fleets today. British steamer Aramore captured by Osceola trying to run blockade and was brought to Key West as prize. It was loaded with lumber and cattle. It is announced in Madrid that the government is preparing another fleet for coast defense. British Captain it is alleged has learned in Cadiz that the Spanish fleet will shell Boston. Koester.

May 23.—Military experts in Washington expect American troops to be in Havana this week. They believe some have already started. It is known that the government could transport twenty-five thousand men from Tampa in thirty-six hours keeping them north of fleets, Sampson, Schley and Cerveras. Koester.

Columbia, S. C., May 23.—Spanish consul at St. Pierre, Martinique, informed this morning that Cerveras fleet would return there to coal. Authorities say shall not coal in that harbor. English steamer Twickenham waiting there with supply of coal for Spaniards. Koester.

May 23.—William Barbee killed, J. M. Colecough fatally injured in a collision in a train bearing the troops and a vegetable train over the P. C. and P. this morning. They were privates in a North Carolina regiment from Durham. Koester.
