SEWERAGE. There is now strong necessity for a system of sewerage in Newberry. Those who opposed water works are now convinced they were wrong and are today the strongest advocates of sewerage. It is so urgent that the system be put in and put in speedily that it seems hardly necessary to argue the point. We should go to work at once and issue \$25,000 of bonds and let the contract be awarded and work commenced at once. Let the bonds run for forty years and then let them be taken up with a new issue and provision be made at that time for their payment. Six per cents. to the amount of \$25,000 would only require a 1 vy of one mill to meet the interest. This lown at this time could not na'te a better investment. It is no use to wait until there is an epidemic of siekness from surface water and then go to work and build the system, when it could be put in now just as well. Provision for the payment of the bonds could be made by the next generation who will also enjoy the benefits of such a system if we build it now.

The dectors all say that it is a cessary to have sewerage in order to preto have sickness that could be prevented by the outlay of a little money. Then why should we wait until next year to do what is needed and what we neither good sense nor good business in [to the above were negroes. waiting. We have waited now for a year when we should have put in sewcrage at the same time that we put in water works. The two go together. It was estimated then that it would cost only about \$12,000 or \$15,000, but we do not believe a good and sufficient system could be put in for less than \$25,-000 and we just as well do it right when we build and be done with it.

The Herald and News would like to have an expression of opinion from some of our citizens on this subject. This is a good time to go to work while we have not much else to do. It is a necessity and must come soone; or later and we just as well confront the situation and be done with it and build now. Of course there will be objectors and kickers but we believe they will be beautifully small.

We would like for the mayor and city fathers to indicate in what way we should proceed to inaugurate the system and we will proceed to proceed.

The health of the citizens of the community is to be considered above almost any other temporal thing. No town can prosper financially that is not healthful. Every step should be taken to seeme the health of the community. That is a public duty. A sewerage system is necessary to the health of this commonity. Then it is a public necessity and a public duty to put sewerage in Newberry at once and without furbody answer?

The sewerage pipes that the town council put down from the hotel to the back of the jail will have to be taken up. It is very offensive at times and will not be conducive to good health if left as at present.

There is nothing left for us to do but to build a sewerage system and the sooner we get at it the better.

ATTEMPTED MURDER AND SUICIDE

Lillie Edwards Shoots Julius Tobe and Ther Turns the Pistol on Her Own Body With Fatal Results.

It is not often that you hear of a negro committing suicide. Certainly not a woman because of jealousy. The fiver passions do not seem to be so well developed in their natures. They frequently fight and kill one another, but not often do they fire the fatal shot into their own breasts.






