EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE MEETING.

Voters Will Not be Allowed to Express Themselves on the Liquor Question at the Ballot Box in the Primary-Arrangements for Campaign Mertings-Candidates Assessed.

Pursuant to the call of County Chairman W. D. Hardy, the County Democratic Executive Committee met in the court house on Saturday at 11 o'clock. The roll call showed twenty-three of See notice of Institute for co'ored the thirty-eight clubs in the county teachers which is to be held next represented, though several members came in after the roll had been called.

> Chairman Hardy presided and Mr. J. C. Chalmers acted as secretary. A quorum being present, the committee settled down to transact the business before it.

Hon. Arthur Kibler appeared before the committee and read the following

letter: To the Democratic Executive Commit-

tee of Newberry County: Gentlemen: When the County Democratic Convention met in May last, a resolution was adopted by a unanimous vote asking the State Democratic Convention to submit the liquor question directly to the reople. The State Convention refused to do this, but instead endorsed the dispensary system as now operated by the State. But this is no reason why your committee should not give the voters of Newberry County the right to express their views on the question. I am sure that the right to give an individual expression would meet with the approbation of all our people. Certainly it will do no harm. ask then that your committee order a box placed at each precinct so that every voter may express his preference as to prohibition, dispensary or high license. By granting this request you will, to a great extent, eliminate the liquor question from county politics, and will not send Representatives to the State Legislature on only one question. Hoping that you may decide to let the people settle the question for Newberry County, I am very truly,

ARTHUR KIBLER. Mr. Kibler was granted ten minutes in which to address the committee, during which time he advocated in an earnest manner the adoption of the plan outlined in his letter, giving many reasons why the request should be granted.

Mr. Alan Johnstone offered the following resolution, which brought the question squarely before the commit-

Resolved: That the Chairman of the Executive Committee be instructed to have boxes enough prepared to supply each club with one and the voters the primary election are requested to vote on the liquor question at said primary. Those favoring prohibition wil vote a ticket on which is written or printed prohibition; those favoring dis pensary will vote a ticket on which is written or printed dispensary, and those favoring a license system will vote a ticket on which is written or printed license. The managers are requested to count votes cast and certify the re sult to the Executive Committee. In the event that neither of these questions receives a majority of the votes east, then the question shall be subnitted at the second primary, th n the second primary to be confined to those two questions securing the highest number of votes in the first pri-

Mr. Johnstone stated in offering the resolution that he could see no harm in allowing the people to express themselves on the liquor question at the ballot box. He rather thought it a good idea, as it would eliminate the would be voted for on their merits.

Mr. F. V. Capers opposed the resolution on the grounds that the State Convention had already acted on the question, and that in his opinion it would be the cause of further strife, confusion and trouble in the county. He wanted the resolution killed.

Mr. R. T. C. Hunter favored the resolution as he would like to see the question taken out of politics.

Mr. W. C. Sligh wanted to know if this question should not be settled by the State Executive Committee.

Chairman Hardy stated that from a letter he had received from the State Cnairman he was satisfied that the County Executive Committee had a right to act as it saw fit in the premises. Mr. J W. D. Johnson also made

necessity of it and thought it would cause confusion.
