The telegraphic report we got from the returns of the vote at Pomaria gave Mr. Kibler one vote when it should have been seven. We made the correction when the official returns came in, and the correction appeared in the extra issue Wednesday.

Meeting of Executive Committee.

The meeting of the Executive Committee to tabulate the vote in the primary was held yesterday in the court house.

The extra of The Herald and News was used with the official returns in tabulating the vote. The returns as made out and signed by the managers were gone over carefully and the corrections marked. With very few exceptions the returns as received and printed by The Herald and News in our extra were correct.

The returns signed by the managers at Glymphville were not received until yesterday morning. The figures that we used were brought us by Mr. John Crooks on the night of the election and we knew they were not official. He had them copied in a memorandum book and from that we made our copy. He had not copied the vote for Mr. Blaise and Mr. Dickert and in the extra sent out no votes were accredited to those gentlemen.

When the official returns came in yesterday Mr. Dickert had 25 votes and Mr. Blaise 19. This increased Mr. Blaise's majority and also gave Mr. Dickert 656 votes which is one more vote than Mr. Banks had, and that changed the result and put Mr. Dickert in the second race. Mr. Dickert also received a good vote from the soldiers which pulled it his total up.

It has gone out by not having the soldier vote and the correct vote at Glymphville that the second race would be between Wyche, Kibler, Evans and Banks, whereas the Executive Committee has ordered a second race between Wyche, Evans, Kibler and Dickert.

It is very close and Capt. Banks may enter a protest so as to have a more thorough investigation and more careful count, but the count as made is correct. If the returns of the managers are correct, the committee made its tabulation and declared the result upon the face of the returns as made by the managers.

Judge Hodges is re-elected by a handsome majority. Mr. Hill beats both competitors by a small majority for County Supervisor.

For County Superintendent of Education a second race will be had between Mr. Higgins and Mr. Keitt with Mr. Higgins in the lead.

The committee ordered a second primary on the 12th of this month and the same managers will act.

Mr. C. L. Blaise was elected assistant secretary. Several bills were presented and ordered paid. The committee declined to pay the \$25 called for it by the State executive committee.

The election passed off pleasantly and all the candidates agree that it has been the most friendly campaign conducted in the county in several years.

The official vote as declared by the executive committee is printed on the first page of this paper.
