**STRUCK BY LIGHTNING.**  
Engineer Graham, of the C. N. & L. R. R. Received a Severe Shock.  
(Record, 26.)  
Engineer S. D. Graham, of the Columbia, Newberry and Laurens railroad, was severely shocked by a stroke of lightning yesterday about 12 o'clock. While at Chapins he got off his engine and was standing on the rail during his locomotive during the rain storm. All at once the lightning struck the rail in front of him and before he could realize it the stroke, which had partially spent itself, ran through his body. He was knocked down and soon became unconscious. No medical attention could be given him at Chapins, so he was carried to Little Mountain, where he was given all the attention possible. The down train to Columbia brought him to this city, and he was taken to his home. Dr. Robert V. Gibbs, the surgeon of the road, was called in. He examined Mr. Graham and found his left arm partially paralyzed. Though the shock was a severe one, still Dr. Gibbs thinks Mr. Graham will be out in a few days. He is resting easy this morning.

**Old Bonds Cancelled - New Bonds Delivered.**  
Mr. C. Guenther, Jr., representing Rudolph Kleybolt & Co., of Cincinnati, Ohio, arrived in Newberry on Wednesday with the money to pay for the new issue of four and a half per cent. bonds of the town of Newberry, and to inspect the cancellation of the old bonds.  
There were present at the cancellation of the old bonds, besides Mr. Guenther, Mayor Mayer, Alderman Cabanis, Chairman of the Finance Committee, Jno. G. Goggans, Clerk and Treasurer, W. H. Hunt, of the firm of Hunt & Hunt, City Attorneys, and Mr. D. H. Wheeler.  
After the cancellation, which was made in red ink, as required by law, Mr. Wheeler delivered the old bonds to the city authorities, and the Mayor delivered to Mr. Guenther the new bonds, \$22,000.00, and received from him a check for \$22,250.00, and a draft for \$74.25, the interest accrued since April 1st, the date of the new bonds. Out of this Mr. Wheeler was paid for his bonds, and the old opera house debt is settled for the present—and a nice little saving to the city is a result of the refunding of the debt.

That Section IV of Chapter I of the Ordinances of said Town, relating to Market, be and the same is hereby repealed.  
Done and ratified under the corporate seal of said Town, this 18th day [SEAL] of April, 1899.

**AN ORDINANCE.**  
WHEREAS, ALL BUTCHERS' Licenses heretofore granted by the Town Council of Newberry, S. C., expire on the 1st day of May, 1899;  
AND WHEREAS, By an Ordinance heretofore passed, all licenses expire on the 21st day of December of the year in which the same are issued;  
AND WHEREAS, It is necessary to provide for Licenses for Butchers from the 1st day of May to the 31st day of December, 1899;  
NOW, THEREFORE, Be it ordained by the Mayor and Aldermen of the Town of Newberry, S. C., in Council assembled, and by authority of the same:  
SECTION 1. That any person selling fresh meat in the town of Newberry, shall pay a license of Sixty-Six Dollars and Sixty-Five Cents, which said license shall cover the period from May the 1st to December the 31st, 1899.  
SEC. 2. That any person convicted of selling fresh meat, without a license, shall be fined not more than Twenty Dollars or be imprisoned not more than twenty days.  
SEC. 3. That this ordinance shall not apply to any person offering for sale fresh beef, pork, mutton or veal produced or grown by the person offering the same for sale.  
Done and ratified under the corporate seal of said Town, this 18th day [SEAL] of April, 1899.
