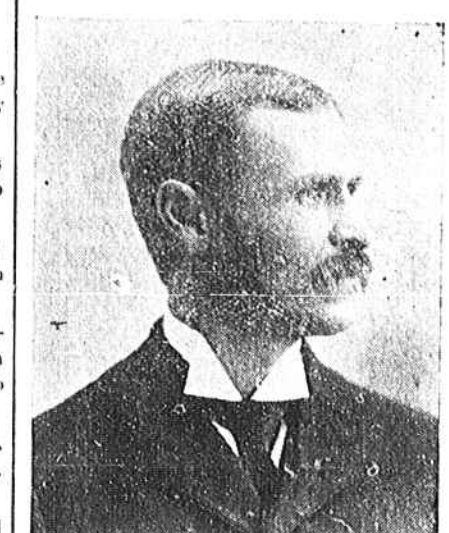

The Speakers at Commencement.

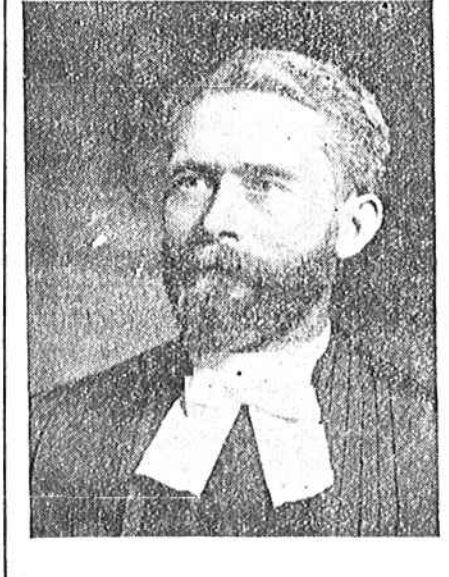

He is a graduate of Pennsylvania College, Gettysburg, with the degree of bachelor of arts, and later received the degree of master of arts from the same institution.

His father, grand-father, three brothers, uncles and great uncles were all Lutheran preachers. The Rev. M. G. He was educated at Roanoke College, Salem, Va., and also took a post-graduate course at Pennsylvania College, and received the degree of Doctor of Philosophy from that institution after completing the course for that degree. He did mission work in Virginia after completing his course at college, and studied theology privately.

He was Secretary of the South Carolina Synod for three years during his work at St. Luke's, besides doing considerable missionary work.
